RECEIVES THE HIGHEST ACADEMIC DEGREE

Walter R. Miles, who took his degree at the S. U. I. yesterday, graduated from Pacific College, Newberg, Ore., in 1906, with the degree of B. S. In 1908 he took the degree of B. A. at Earlham college, Richmond, Ind. During the years of 1908 and 1909 he was Professor of Psychology and Education at Penn college, Oskaloosa, Iowa. In the fall of 1909 he took up post graduate work at the S. U. I., and in 1910 received the S. U. I. degree of M. A., but decided then to continue and work for the highest academic degree given, and continued his studies at the university up to the present time. He has now completed four years post graduate work, and yesterday received the degree of Ph. D. He has prosecuted and completed the major work in Psychology, and minor work in the department of Education or Pedigogy. His special work throughout the course has been research work, making as his theme, "The Accuracy of the Human Voice in Singing." The instrument with which he has prosecuted his work, the Seashore Tonoscope, is the only instrument of its kind in the world, having been developed in the Iowa university Psych. laboratory during the last ten years through the efforts and ingenuity of Carl E. Seashore and others. The position which Mr. Miles has accepted, as Professor of Psychology at Wesleyan university, Middletown, Connecticut, promises to be one of wide usefulness and we bespeak for him in his new career eminent success as has characterized all his efforts at college and university.—West Branch, Iowa Times.

A WORD FROM AN OLD SOLDIER

On Wednesday night while seated among the old veterans at the camp fire the Graphic man said to one of them, namely M. H. Steelsmith, 118th Ohio Infantry, that he was somewhat disappointed in the program of the evening as he came expecting to hear from the lips of the old boys incidents of the war, rather than a latter day program. Putting his hand in his pocket he drew out a slip of paper saying that while he was seated on a goods box resting during the day he put down a few of his thoughts which could be published if desired, though he did not have time to complete what he wanted to say.

Following is the article: Comrades:

I congratulate you upon your healthy, clean, well dressed appearance and good looks.

I have had the opportunity of attending reunions in Ohio, Iowa and Oregon, where they sold intoxicants and where they did not, and my opinion and approbation is given freely upon the appearance, health and conduct of those comrades who inhabit dry territory. As you all know there was little restraint thrown around us while in the service and temptation prevailed on all sides and being young, healthy and vigorous with little experience it is not to be wondered at that many fell outside the moral line of rectitude. The wonder is that so many of us have lived to see fifty years pass since our marches and battles, since those days that tried men's souls. But this line is not the one I intended to make remarks upon. We, through trials and the sacrifice of the best years of our lives, saved our government and wiped the stain from our generation that would have been a stigma upon our intelligence, a disgrace to our nation. But, my comrades, our duty is not done while we are a part of our institutions, that is, while we live, for eternal vigilance is the price of liberty. There are issues constantly coming up that require intelligent and close study. Now in a time of peace I will name a few issues that should have your critical analysis. First, we purchased a territory from Columbia and have almost finished a canal across the isthmus of Panama at a cost of 375 millions of dollars. Should we control that property absolutely, if not, why not? Second, should California and every other state control its land tenure, or should those not eligible to citizenship have title to land wherever they see fit? If treaties made with foreign

powers deprive us of the control of property bought and built with our money, built by our engineers, then should these treaties be abrogated? Should we give Porto Rico self government? If not, why? Should we withdraw our forces from the Philippine Islands and tell other nations "hands off"? In other words let them govern themselves and learn to make progress from their errors? Should we interfere in Mexico? Should our Government guarantee payment of money loaned to other nations for war purposes? If not, why?
