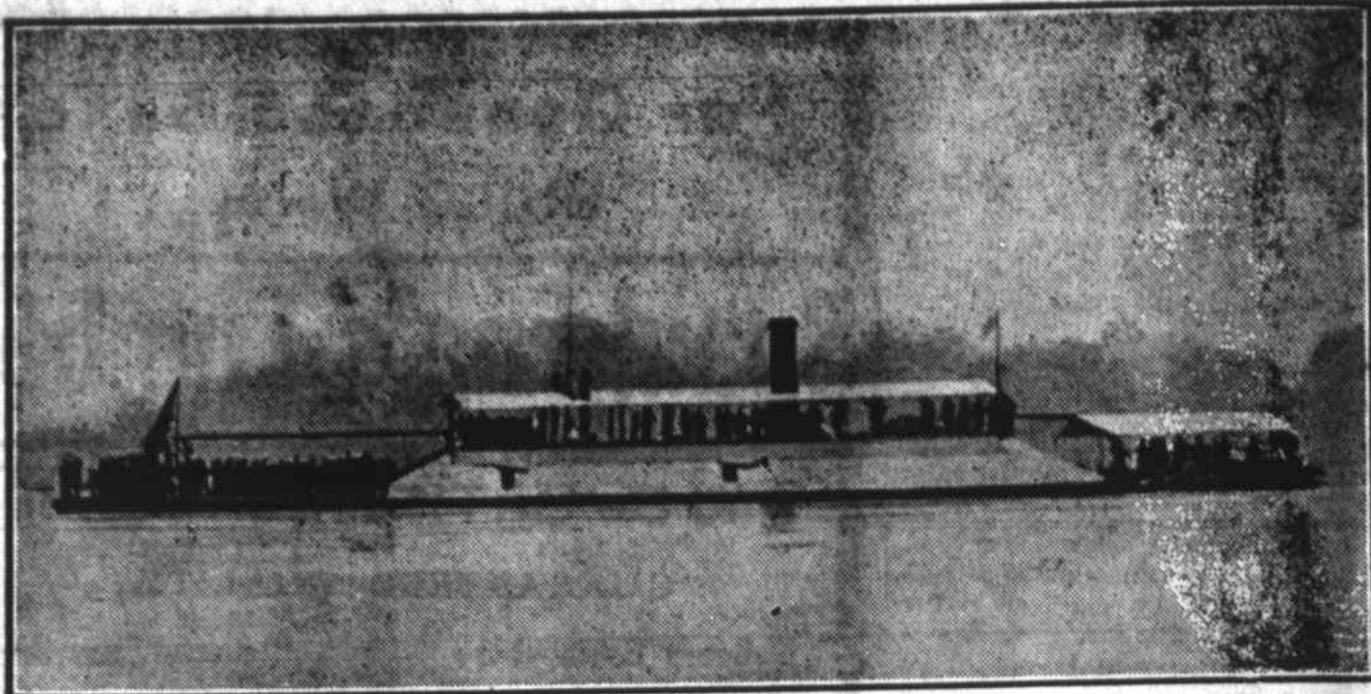

ENGINE JUMPS TRACK

Rolls Down Hill Taking Engineer Who is Severely Injured.

Early Monday morning the engine of the Southern Pacific work train left the track at a curve on the heavy grade just west of Rex, making a bad wreck of it and severely injuring the engineer, A. F. Knight whose home is in Portland.

The train was coming west on the down grade at a rate of about twenty-five an hour, so the crew state when the accident occurred.

One of the brakemen stated that he was riding in the caboose and on looking out saw the engine tender careening over, it seeming to leave the track first. He says he saw something was going to happen and he ducked his head. The caboose remained on the track and although it was on a heavy down grade the automatic brake acted so quickly that the car was stopped within a hundred feet. Running back they saw the engine laying in a scrap heap down the embankment. The fireman, O. J. Dougherty, had leaped from the engine in time to save himself, but as the engineer was not to be seen they supposed he was killed in the fall. Failing to find him in the tall weeds and grass a look was taken in the direction of the engine when he was seen in the cab on his all-fours. He was carried out in a dazed, semi-conscious condition and taken to the home of Mr. Chambers near by where he was placed in Mr. Chambers' auto and hurried into Newberg where he was given a hasty examination by Dr. Littlefield and later placed on the 9:47 train for Portland. He was severely bruised about the head and also injured in one shoulder, but is reported to be getting on as well as could be expected.

The fireman was not so severely hurt, though he was also taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland. Considering the tumble the engine took and the way it was wrecked the wonder is that both men were not killed instantly.

The cause of the wheels leaving the track seems to be a puzzle to the railroad men.

A wrecking crew arrived in the evening with material for laying a track for the purpose of getting the engine up the hill and onto the rails again.

At 7:30 the roses began to come in and continued in such numbers that VanBlaricom's store was drawn on time and again to supply jars. A special invitation was extended to the visiting delegates at the various halls to attend the show and many pronounced the display fully equal in quality to the Portland Rose Show. The Glen Gardens furnished a beautiful display of sweet peas including 32 distinct varieties. OREGON YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS CHURCH

Within an hour the sum of \$8,000 was subscribed, this being the sum asked for.

Those subscribing \$500 each were C. J. Edwards, John Pemberton, Henry Mills, Jesse Hobson, O. J. Sherman. And those subscribing \$250 each were E. H. Woodward, Lewis Crozer, J. L. Haworth and W. E. Crozer. Besides these there was sixteen one hundred dollar, twenty-four fifty dollar and nine twenty-five dollar subscriptions.

The meeting also made an appropriation of \$1,000 for the college and \$200 for Greenleaf Academy located at Greenleaf, Idaho.

At a later session it was voted to guarantee the interest on the last half of a \$100,000 endowment fund until such a time as the securing of the full amount of \$100,000 can be completed.

Much attention was given to evangelistic work during the week and the sum of \$1000 was raised to assist in this branch of the service during the coming year. H. Elmer Pemberton was re-elected evangelistic superintendent; with Homer L. Cox as chairman of the committee.

On Sunday, Arthur Chilson, the African missionary, spoke in the morning, Amos Kenworthy in the afternoon and Harry R. Keats in the evening. At the morning service \$500 was subscribed for the building of a new church at Quilcene, Washington, and all told more than \$10,000 was raised during the week for the various lines of work. This record has probably never been excelled by any church in the country of the same membership. The subjects of Bible schools, peace and arbitration, temperance, systematic giving etc. claimed the attention of the meeting at the different sessions. The meetings closed on Tuesday afternoon with harmony and good feeling prevailing.
