He was licensed to preach in the Methodist church in 1849. He took a medical course in Nashville, Tennessee, and in New Orleans, La., and was granted a medical diploma by the medical society of Nashville. During the war he lived in the South but was exempt from military duty. He ministered to the sick and the wounded however and conducted funeral services. In 1874 he came to Oregon with his family and continued to preach until he was compelled to retire from active service on account of failing strength. He leaves a wife, two daughters and two sons. Funeral services were conducted on last Monday by Rev. Hiram Gould, an old friend of the family.
