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READ AND CONSIDER

City Ordinance Covering Vehicle Traffic in Newberg.

Ordinance No. 329.

An ordinance to regulate and control traffic on the streets and other public places within the corporate limits of the city of Newberg and repealing all ordinances in conflict herewith, and declaring an emergency.

The people of the city of Newberg do ordain as follows:

Section 1. All persons, driving, operating or in any manner using a vehicle on any street or other public place within the corporate limits of the city of Newberg shall, in all respects, conform to the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2. A vehicle, excepting when passing a vehicle ahead, shall keep as near the right hand curb as possible.

Section 3. A vehicle passing another vehicle from the rear, shall pass on the left-hand side of the overtaken vehicle, and shall not pull over to the right until entirely clear of it.

Section 4. A vehicle meeting another vehicle shall pass to the right.

Section 5. A vehicle turning into another street to the right shall turn the corner as near to the curb as possible.

Section 6. A vehicle turning into another street to the left shall turn around the center of the intersection of the streets.

Section 7. A vehicle crossing from one side of the street to another shall do so by moving on a curve and shall not move directly across such street nor shall it pass across such street in a diagonal line.

Section 8. No vehicle shall stop with its left side to the curb.

Section 9. No vehicle shall remain backed up to the curb except when actually loading or unloading, and if said vehicle is horse-drawn and has four wheels, the horse or horses must stand parallel to the curb and faced in the direction of traffic, but no vehicle shall remain backed up to the curb if it interferes with or interrupts traffic.

Section 10. No vehicle shall back to make a turn in any street, if by so doing it interferes with other vehicles, but shall go around the block into a street sufficiently wide to turn in without backing.

Section 11. Vehicles hauling any portion of the apparatus of the fire department of the city of Newberg shall have the right of way.

Section 12. No vehicle of any kind whatsoever shall proceed at any time at a speed greater than fifteen miles per hour within the corporate limits of the city of Newberg, except vehicles hauling or drawing some portion of the apparatus of the fire department.

Section 13. No motor car, automobile or motorcycle shall turn from one side of the street to the other or otherwise turn in an opposite direction at any point except at a street intersection.

Section 14. Every automobile, motor vehicle or motorcycle shall use the "muffler" so called and the same shall not be cut out or disconnected within the

corporate limits of the city of Newberg.

Section 15. No person operating any automobile, autocar or motorcycle or other motor vehicle in the city of Newberg shall leave the same standing in the street unattended with the engine still running.

Section 16. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof before the recorder of the city of Newberg, shall be punished by the payment of a fine of not less than \$10 for the first offense and not less than \$25 for every offense thereafter or by imprisonment in the city jail for not less than 5 days for the first offense and not less than 10 days for each offense thereafter, and if any fine imposed as herein provided be not paid, then such offender shall be confined in the city jail until such fine and costs of prosecution are fully paid at the rate of \$2 per day.

Section 17. That it is necessary for the health, peace and safety of the people of the city of Newberg that traffic should be at once regulated upon the streets of said city; therefore an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the mayor.
