PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

This week's cattle market has been one of the most active ones of the year. Monday had one of the largest single day runs, containing considerable good quality of beef. Prime steer top is steady to strong at \$8.00 to \$8.25; cows and heifers \$7.00 to \$7.25 with occasional sales 15 cents to 20 cents higher. Outlet is broad and buyers keen for prime stuff.

The hog market has run wild for six days, jumping in price from \$9.35 a week ago to \$10. Receipts have been unusually light and the trade has been unable to fill orders for pork supply. The \$10.00 price equals
