TUALATIN ROAD IN COURT AGAIN

The famous stretch of road in Tualatin which has figured in several more or less sensational court cases, in one of which a charge of firing a shotgun at county employes engaged in moving a fence was tried, has bobbed up again in the circuit court. Mrs. Janey McE. Galbreath Monday filed a cause against Judge Reasoner and Commissioners, Hanley and Nyberg as the county court to quiet title to the strip of land in controversy. The complaint charges that the court is about to spread rock and gravel on the ground and make of it a public highway and the complaint asks that an

injunction issue to restrain the work until the case can be tried. The controversy has now extended over several years and began when the county removed a fence in front of Mrs. Galbreath's property which was declared to encroach on the county road. The fence was replaced during the night and it was when men under the direction of Supervisor Casteel was removing it for the second time that the shooting took place.—Hillsboro Independent.

THE NEW PISTOL LAW

It is now not only unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell, barter or give away any revolver or pocket pistol unless the purchaser is provided with a permit from the proper officer, but it is unlawful for any retail dealer to even display such a weapon for sale. An exception is made in the law in favor of policemen, members of the militia and peace officers of the state.

Under the terms of the new law the municipal judge or city recorder of the city or county judge or justice of the peace of the county in which the prospective purchaser resides, may issue the permit when he shall furnish an affidavit from at least two reputable freeholders as to his good moral character. Further, it is provided that dealers engaged in the sale of revolvers and pistols shall keep a record of their sale by registering the name of the purchaser and the number of the weapon. This information is to be transmitted to the sheriff of the county in which the dealer lives on the first and 15th of each month.
