OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Reeves Invited to Go With Oregon. Pendleton.—W. T. Reeves, pioneer of Stanfield, who conceived the idea of the battleship Oregon leading the first fleet through the Panama canal and who prepared the petitions signed by 65,000 school children, has been given official recognition as the father of the idea in the form of an invitation to be a guest of honor aboard the Oregon in its passage through the big ditch. The invitation came from Secretary of Navy Josephus Daniels, who asked that Mr. Reeves be present as a representative of the school children of the state.

Hood Asks Exhibit Space.

Hood River.—To make an estimate of the funds that it will be necessary for the county court to appropriate and include in next year's budget, the Hood River Commercial club has been endeavoring to find how much space can be obtained for Hood River exhibits at the International Panama exhibition at San Francisco. It is the purpose of the club to aid the court in making two exhibits, one in the Oregon building and the other in the palace of horticulture.

Judge Says Election Will Not Hold.

Roseburg.—Judge Hamilton, in the circuit court, has declared void an election held in school district No. 5, October 13, at which \$3000 was voted for the purpose of building a new school house. The court held that October 13 was Columbus day and therefore a legal holiday, and that an election is a quasi-judicial function and not merely an administrative one.

Oregon Boy's Cow Wins.

Monmouth.—According to a telegram received here from Chicago, a yearling Jersey cow, belonging to Johnny B. Stump, 12-year-old son of J. B. Stump of this city, carried away the sweepstakes against cattle from all parts of the United States at the National livestock show.

WEST ON SCHOOL SURVEYS

Predicts Trouble for Interior Department if Certain Conditions Continue.

Salem.—Declaring that the interior department will find itself in hot water if it attempts to hold up title to all surveyed lands passed to the state at the time the surveys were approved, and such lands are not valid as bases for indemnity selections when they are within a federal forest reserve, Governor West has given out a statement presenting the view of his office in the matter.

The question has come up before the department in Washington, where Miss Fern Hobbs, the governor's private secretary, is endeavoring to get a number of state land matters settled for the benefit of the state. About 15,000 acres are involved in the controversy, but the governor states that less than 1000 acres are surveyed. So if the department makes the ruling contemplated it will not seriously affect this state, but will largely affect other states.

Farmer and Family Suffer Bruises.

Milton.—J. Thomas, a rancher living near Walla Walla, while driving his wife and five children in their auto on the macadamized road between Weston and Athena met with an accident. A tire blew up and the car left the road and turned over two or three times, pinning the occupants beneath. All were painfully bruised.

Raw Wheat Eaten, Kills.

Enterprise.—Mrs. W. F. Craig died at the family home just south of Enterprise, after a brief illness. Acute peritonitis was given as the cause of death. This was induced, the physicians said, by eating raw wheat which did not digest and led to inflammation of the peritoneum.

Dr. Brosius Gets Medal.

Hood River.—Dr. F. C. Brosius, one of Hood River's leading physicians, has just received a silver medal from the adjutant general of the Oregon national guard, in recognition of his 15 years of service. Dr. Brosius holds a commission as major in the medical corps.

Husband Shoots Man With Wife.

Pendleton.—Charles Cook shot and perhaps fatally wounded David Rowan, then, turning his weapon, he killed himself instantly. The reason ascribed for the attempted murder is jealousy. Rowan was with Cook's wife on the streets at the time he was shot.

\$4,481 Are Registered.

Salem.—The total registration in the state under the permanent registration law, passed by the recent session of the legislature, is \$4,481.

NEWS FROM OUR NATIONAL CAPITAL

Senate Banking Committee Is Likely to Report Four-Bank Plan.

Washington, D. C.—When the senate banking and currency committee ended its first week of deliberations it appeared certain that the bill to be reported to the senate would contain certain provisions for a four regional reserve, government controlled bank system, the \$100,000,000 stock of which will be offered to the public.

With progress on the fundamentals of the senate measure just begun, only the framework of the Glass-Owen measure has been retained. The most radical change in the administration measure has been the complete removal of the regional reserve banks from bank control. Briefly, the following were the provisions of the measure, which it was believed would govern its final drafting.

Four regional reserve banks with a total capitalization of \$100,000,000, divided according to the financial location of the center from which the banks will operate.

Absolute control of the banks by the government and regional reserve boards, to be appointed by the president.

The regional reserve bank stock to bear either 5 or 6 per cent interest and to be sold to the public by subscription, the balance, if any, to be taken up by the member banks. This stock will have no voting power, and will not share in the surplus. That will accrue to the government.

Co-operation With States Proposed.

If congress, at the regular session, will authorize an additional loan of \$100,000,000 to the reclamation fund, in accordance with the recommendation to be submitted by Secretary Lane, the interior department will undertake, in co-operation with the several states, to redeem those Carey act projects which have proven failures, and which threaten, without some such aid, to entail heavy loss on settlers who have undertaken to establish homes under their canals.

The plan of the interior department is to have the federal government join with the states in completing Carey act projects which have failed to disrepute through failure of contractors or from other cause.

Members Lose Mileage.

Senators and representatives will be obliged to forego the mileage bill at the coming regular session of congress, much as they may dislike to do so. The fact that the special session is to run into the regular session without substantial break makes it impracticable for congress to pass the mileage appropriations this winter, and if any attempt is made to put such a bill through it will be killed by public opinion.

Senators and members have received mileage for the special session. Mail Efficiency Is Aim.

Postmaster General Burleson has decided to standardize the entire postal service, so far as possible, with a view to greater efficiency. To this end the department will operate several model offices, "dynamos" from which to charge the entire system of offices throughout the country. These offices will be used to discover the best practical way of administering the postal facilities and to test out devices and methods that may prove of value.

National Capital Brevities.

The secretary of war is urged to modify the examination required for students desiring to enter West Point. The plea is made that 60 per cent of the applicants fail. A government preparatory school is suggested as one remedy.

The constitution limiting the membership of the house of representatives to 450 has been commenced by Representative Cardell Hull of Tennessee, author of the income tax provision of the Underwood tariff bill.

In transportation of stocks, bonds and other securities, the interstate commerce commission held that a carrier is responsible, in case of loss, for the market value of the securities only and not the par value.

By direction of President Wilson, Commissioner of Internal Revenue Osborne instructed collectors throughout the country that the recent action of congress in removing deputy collectors from the protection of the civil service did not mean a return to the spoils system and was taken only for efficiency.

Preparations have been begun for the wedding of Miss Jessie Wilson, daughter of the president, and Francis B. Sayre. Though the White House is reticent as to details, it is given out that the date certainly will be November 25 and that the ceremony will take place in the White House, where it is said the bride will have for her attendants her two sisters, Margaret and Eleanor.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

George Bingham, a prominent business man of Oregon City, was mistaken for a deer near Trail and was shot and killed.

The senate, after a bitter fight confirmed the nomination of Frank McManamy of Portland to be chief inspector of locomotive boilers for the interstate commerce commission.

Governor West has honored a requisition for the return to Kankakee, Ill., of Samuel Perlin, accused of operating a confidence game.

A vinegar plant with an annual capacity of 10,000 gallons, began operation at the Eugene Fruit Growers' association cannery, turning to a profit cull apples that heretofore have been entirely wasted.

Fifty Roseburg merchants have formed a company, known as the Roseburg Stamp company, incorporated, the purpose being to conduct trading stamp business to meet the competition of foreign trading stamps.

Senator Chamberlain will endeavor to induce the war department to withdraw the plan of having Sand Island ceded to Oregon. The senator held a conference with Major McIndoe, who is now in Washington.

Senator Lane has been advised by the commissioner of the general land office that a survey has been completed and accepted of three townships in Lake county, which will permit the opening of these lands for entry about the last week in November.

With apparently not the slightest fear, but protesting their innocence to the last, Mike Spanos and Frank Seymour, slayers of George Dedaskalou of Medford, went to their deaths calmly on the scaffold at the state penitentiary.

Representative Hawley has been advised by architects of the treasury department that plans for the new federal building at Medford have about reached completion, and that this building will soon be ready to submit for bids.

Senator Lane saved H. F. Ferry, a doorkeeper at the government printing office, his job. The man had been dismissed for showing the president's wife through the offices without first bringing her direct to Public Printer Ford.

The Parelus Manufacturing company of Portland, which has the contract for the interior furnishings of the new supreme court building at Salem, has been notified by Labor Commissioner Hoff that it must not work its employees more than eight hours a day.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill has announced that the thirteenth annual convention of the Oregon State Teachers' association, Eastern division, to be held in La Grande, November 24, 25 and 26, will be the most important in the history of the division.

Senator Lane is preparing a bill directing the grant of 250,000 acres of public land to the state of Oregon, the same to be sold at no less than \$4 an acre, and the proceeds applied to construction of public roads. He will probably frame the bill giving California and Washington similar grants.

Senator Chamberlain has introduced a bill granting Oregon 4250 acres of swamp lands in townships 37, 38 south, range 10 east, Willamette meridian, heretofore considered Indian lands. He has also introduced a bill authorizing a preliminary examination and survey of the mouth of the Umpqua river.

A hay shortage threatens Wallowa county before spring. Diversified farming has led to the production of slightly less hay in the southern part of the county than in the old days, before the railroad came. Now stock feeding is developing on a considerable scale, and all the hay available will be needed for this purpose.

L. L. Haines, a rancher of Eckley, Curry county, was shot fatally by his brother-in-law, Hugh Hampton. Haines, who is unmarried and about 40 years old, has shown signs of insanity. He attacked a sister at one time, beating her severely, and this is presumed to have caused the shooting.

An industry that promises much future development recently has been launched in the unfrequented sections of central and southern Oregon by the Oregon Borax company, a subsidiary of the American Soda Products company of Portland and San Francisco. The project is an extensive and an important one. It provides immediate development of the soda deposits in Alkali lake, Lake county. It is said that these deposits now are in the form of carbonate of soda—a product that enjoys a ready market.

During the week beginning November 10 competition for the trophy to be presented by the bankers of Oregon to the best company in marksmanship of the Oregon National guard, will be held on general order just issued by Adjutant General Finzer. It must be competed for annually. It will be awarded to the company getting the highest percentage on a basis of 33 1-3 of the enrolled strength of the company at the date of last muster.
