SCHOOL NOTES FROM THE COUNTY AT LARGE

The financial part of the 1914 school fair has been provided for, but the prize lists cannot be placed in the hands of the pupils till the Fair Board is appointed. But this fact need not hinder the pupils of the county from beginning the work, as no doubt the list will be along the same lines as before, with such changes as added experience may make seem best. The same contests will also be carried on, but the amount of the prizes can not now be stated for the reasons given above. We hope, however, that the boys will begin at once to plan for the corn contest by properly fertilizing the ground, and securing the best seed obtainable. Those who plan to enter the egg and tomato contests can also begin at once, and we hope to have even more enter than we had last year. The first prize in the tomato contest has been awarded to Gilbert Fones, of White Cloud district, Carlton, and the second to Raymond Jenkins of the same district. Others secured splendid yields, and all who entered are to be congratulated on their success. Gilbert has sold the calf won by him and known as "The Pepper Prize," and gone into the hog raising industry. He promises a live stock exhibit at the next fair.

Alfred Clemenson, of Springbrook, in a letter acknowledging the receipt of his prize money, says he is planning to do all he can for the 1914 fair. So although the prize list is not yet published, the pupils of the county are already making preparations for the coming exhibit.

A recent visit to the school at Rex found everything in good condition, and the people enthusiastic over the work of the Rural School Improvement Club. They are planning to start a piano fund, and soon they will be well equipped for the literary entertainments that are coming to be considered an important part of school work.

We found the school at Dundee doing splendid work, and the number of pupils in the high school would be a surprise to anyone who had not kept posted on the growth of the high school in Oregon. The four rooms are crowded to the limit, and the building problem, so recently settled there, will soon be a live one again.
