RADIUM ONCE EXTRACTED CAN BE USED FOR GENERATIONS

The effort of the Federal Government should be, and Secretary Lane states that he believes it will be, directed to the promotion of all mining of radium ores in Colorado and Utah, in any and every way conducive to the protection of America's interest in the product. Early exhaustion of these deposits in the sense that we speak of exhaustion of other mineral resources is something which need not be feared. The radium once extracted from the ores becomes available for continued use without appreciable loss and becomes a permanent addition to the needed supply. The same radium that is placed at humanity's service today may be used by our children for many generations.

Whatever the percentage of American ores now exported from mines in private ownership and largely under corporate control, it is, in Secretary Lane's opinion, only equitable and humane to assure America preferential rights to the radium on land still in public ownership. It is for control to this end that the legislation is proposed, and such control is to be secured through the immediate opening of mines and the prompt extraction of the radium from the ores mined.
