PORTLAND SHOWS

BEST HEALTH RATE

Washington, Feb. 11.—A satisfactory condition of the public health in 1913 is indicated by the general death rate of 13.8 per 1000 of estimated population in the registration states and cities, statistics for which the Census Bureau announced to-day. The rate for the same territory in 1912 was 13.6 and in 1911 was 13.9 per 1000.

Of the 18 registration states, Maryland, with 16.3 per 1000, showed the highest rate; Minnesota, with 10.7, the lowest. Other states' rates were: California, 13.4; Colorado, 11.9; Connecticut, 14.4; Indiana, 12.8; Kentucky, 13.4; Massachusetts, 14.7; Michigan, 13.1; Missouri, 12.4; Montana, 13.0; New Hampshire, 14.1; New Jersey, 14.7; New York, 15.2; Ohio, 13.1; Utah, 11.6; Vermont, 12.6; Wisconsin, 10.9.

Of the 45 registration cities, Portland, Ore., with 11.0 per 1000, showed the lowest rate; Memphis, with 22.9, the highest.

Other cities' rates were: Los Angeles, 14.9; Oakland, Cal., 12.3; San Francisco, 16.7; Denver, 14.5; Washington, 17.5; Atlanta, 17.3; Chicago, 17.1; Indianapolis, 16.3; Louisville, 17.2; New Orleans, 21.3; Baltimore, 19.4; Boston, 17.2; Detroit, 19.2; Minneapolis, 13.0; Kansas City, 16.3; St. Louis, 16.2; Omaha, 15.3; New York, 16.2; Cincinnati, 17.2; Cleveland, 15.7; Columbus, 16.2.

LIFE WITH THE ESKIMOS.

Their Flesh Strawn Ice Huts Resemble Slaughter Houses.

My first view of the interior of Uck-Gluck's arctic residence would have been a disheartening one to a tenderfoot. To me, after nine hours of freezing, nothing had ever seemed quite so welcome and cheering as the hollowed out stone in which a liberal quantity of seal oil and moss was burning. (The moss was used as a wick, and so answered the purpose of both lamp and stove.) Three children were crowded together at the end of the igloo staring silently. Uck-Gluck's kooner or woman stood with an infant in her arms, grinning broadly and cheerfully at us.

The room was about eighteen feet in diameter and was a veritable shambles. Uck-Gluck possessed a reputation as being a great hunter, and he had been especially successful of late. Masses of flesh lay strawn all about the floor. There seemed apparently to be no effort or desire to keep it in one or two piles. It lay everywhere. There was the whole carcass of a walrus, cut up and strewn about, and almost directly at the head of the raised "platform" of ice which formed a bed for the whole family there was a great pile of entrails, preserved for dog meat. The walls of the igloo were spattered with blood, and weapons of the chase lay everywhere. These included spears and harpoons, long knives and a rifle that fired powder and ball.

A large quantity of meat, killed earlier in the season, and arrived at the age and stage where it possessed a very bad odor. This was not for the dogs, Uck-Gluck and his family would have fed them the fresh meat before they would have sacrificed this particular pile, which was just reaching that mellow and ripe condition which strongly appeals to their palate.

Bernard and Outta came into the igloo a few moments later, and so delighted were Uck-Gluck and his wife to learn that both of the kablunaks or white men were to eat and sleep under their roof that they disported themselves like children, dancing about and laughing and chattering in their own tongue. Bernard told me that in his pleasure Uck-Gluck was saying that in return for the honor the white men were showing him he would give the kablunaks the greatest hunting that white men had ever had.

As we had come to hunt, and as Uck-Gluck was noted all along the coast for his prowess, this was highly satisfactory. Bernard brought in his oil stove, and we began at once to prepare our supper, as we had eaten nothing but frozen meat since morning. We fried our own deer meat, heated a number of ship biscuits, a can of corn and a can of tomatoes and made about a gallon of tea. Uck-Gluck and his family accepted the tea and biscuits as great delicacies, but only Ishya, his wife, took advantage of the stove to cook her meat. With their knives the Eskimos cut off chunks from the meat strewn about and devoured it raw, laughing and chuckling as they feasted. One of the children, a boy of seven or eight, ate a strip of pure fat that must have weighed nearly a pound.—James Oliver Curwood in *Luck's*

LAID A TRAP FOR LISZT.

And the Famous and Feeble Old Master Walked Right Into It.

"Begin by putting the piano in the farthest, darkest corner of the room and put all sorts of heavy things on it. Then he won't think you have asked him in the hope of hearing him play, and perhaps we can persuade him." The arrangements were just finished as the rest of the company arrived. We were not a large party, and the talk was pleasant enough. Liszt looked much older, so colorless, his skin like ivory, but he seemed just as animated and interested in everything.

After luncheon, when they were smoking (all of us together; no one went into the smoking room), he and Hatzfeldt began talking about the empire and the beautiful fetes at Compiègne, where anybody of any distinction in any branch of art or literature was invited. Hatzfeldt led the conversation to some evenings where Strauss played his waltzes with an entrain, a sentiment that no one else has ever attained, and to Offenbach and his melodies—one evening particularly when he had improvised a song for the empress—he couldn't quite remember it. If there were a piano—he looked about. There was none apparently. "Oh, yes, in a corner, but so many things upon it, it was evidently never meant to be opened."

He moved toward it. Liszt following, asking Comtesse A. if it could be opened. The things were quickly removed. Hatzfeldt sat down and played a few bars in rather a halting fashion. After a moment Liszt said: "No, no; it is not quite that." Hatzfeldt got up. Liszt seated himself at the piano, played two or three bits of songs or waltzes, then, always talking to Hatzfeldt, let his fingers wander over the keys and by degrees broke into a nocturne and a wild Hungarian march. It was very curious. His fingers looked as if they were made of yellow ivory, so thin and long, and of course there wasn't any strength or execution in his playing—it was the touch of an old man, but a master—quite unlike anything I have ever heard. When he got up he said, "Oh, well, I didn't think the old fingers had any music left in them."—Mme. Waddington in *Scribner's*.

Weight on Mars.

In answer to the question, "Would the people on Mars weigh half as much as we do on earth, as Mars is one-half the diameter of the earth?" the New York American answers:

The diameter of the earth is 1 and that of Mars is .53. The density of the earth is 1 and that of Mars is .73. Equating and solving, the unknown quantity appears as .38—that is, the force of attraction exerted by the quantity of matter in the earth on any body on its average surface distance from its center is 1, and the attraction exerted by the quantity of matter in Mars on its surface at mean distance from its center is .38. Then a man weighing 150 pounds around here on our earth would weigh fifty-seven pounds on Mars.

Sacks Which Grow on Trees.

From a species of antiarus (the genus which includes the upas tree) sacks are made in western India by the following singular process: A branch is cut corresponding to the length and diameter of the sack wanted. It is soaked a little and then beaten with clubs till the fiber separates from the wood. This done, the sack formed of the bark is turned inside out and pulled down, and then the wood is sawed off, with the exception of a small piece left to form the bottom of the sack.
