THE CARE OF EGGS.

In the summer months eggs should receive the same care and consideration as cream and milk, and be marketed daily if possible. They should not be exposed to draughts of warm air, and should be protected from the rays of the sun and from moisture, in handling, marketing and shipping. The common practice of holding eggs for a higher market price in autumn results in poor quality and serious loss instead of gain. Under ordinary farm conditions eggs should never be held. The farmer, however, is not the only one responsible for the shrunken eggs on the market. Country agents have been equally blamable for the annual loss.

A fresh egg will absorb odors as readily as fresh milk. Mustiness or mouldy growth in egg cases or fillers will taint the egg and lower its quality.

Eggs should not be stored in musty cellars, or in rooms with fruit, vegetables or fish.

The flock should never be allowed to drink filthy water, be fed musty grains or strong flavored vegetables, as onions and garlic, nor given access to decaying meat or substances that will flavor the product and impair its quality.—N. E. Chapman, Extension Poultry Specialist, University Farm, St. Paul.

INSECTS' SENSE OF SMELL.

Most Acute of All the Creatures in the Animal World.

The most valuable faculty possessed by insects is their sense of smell. Most insects hear very poorly, and ants in particular are absolutely deaf. With all their batteries of eyes bulging in every direction these creatures do not seem to enjoy very good eyesight. Some of the flying insects can't see well enough to avoid obstacles which to them should look as big as a barn.

But when it comes to the sense of smell the insect world is far ahead of any animal. Fabre, the great French entomologist, confined some female butterflies in a steel cage far from the natural haunts of the insects. To his surprise males of the species came from miles away and lit on the screen.

He then confined the females in hermetically sealed jars and placed them near places frequented by the males. Not one paid any attention though the females were visible through the glass.

To make sure that the sense of smell was the guiding force, Professor Fabre brought out some bits of paper and twigs on which the females had rested. Males soon appeared and, ignoring the females in their glass jars, circled about the twigs and paper.

If a strange ant of the same species is placed in an ant hill he is violently ejected. Every insect he meets recognizes him instantly as an intruder and helps in the ejection. If every New Yorker could recognize on sight each stranger in town it would not be so remarkable, as out of town people might be identified by their clothes, cut of their hair, speech, etc. The ants all wear the same shiny uniform and are deaf and dumb.

If a small mouse dies in a field certain undertaker insects known as sylphs and necrophors will journey from distances of more than a mile to lay eggs in the body.

The house fly acts solely on the sense of smell. In his flying about he is perpetually trying to head in the direction of each breath of food odor he meets and dodges and turns with each eddy of air until he locates the source of the smell.

Mosquitoes find you in the dark rather more easily than in the day. They smell their victims outside the house. Their sense of smell leads them to windows, doors or chimneys from which the man odor proceeds. In they go and soon you hear their song about your ears.

The flea and the night prowling carnivorous insect which inhabits beds also locate their prey by their olfactory sense.—New York American.
