ABOUT CHINESE EGGS.

During recent months much attention has been attracted to Chinese eggs along the Pacific coast on account of the absence of duty on such foreign stocks. Eggs from China have been coming to this country rather freely, and while there has been more or less discontent and grumbling among producing interests regarding these importations, it seems to look as if producers have been far more scared than hurt. While it is true that Chinese eggs brought to the Pacific Coast have been landed from the ships at a total cost to importers of perhaps eight cents per dozen, in this sensational price does not mean ruin to the poultry and egg industry of the Pacific Coast, as first glance would indicate.

In the first place, recent prices of eggs here, notwithstanding this talk about Chinese eggs, have been about three cents per dozen higher than this same time a year ago when there were no foreign eggs available. This one statement should allay the fears of producers, although a most careful investigation of the Chinese egg proposition fails to show it, under present conditions, there is the slightest cause for alarm among our henneries.

Chinese eggs can be easily distinguished by their color—if not their smell. They are dark brown, with a slight tint of red. The eggs are of small size and it is, perhaps, two of them to equal the average American hen's.

It will be many years before distributing facilities in China will become so adequate that there need be much fear of Chinese eggs upon the home trade, not forgetting the fact that they are not fresh. Because of the scarcity of railroads, it takes much time to bring Chinese eggs to the tidewater ports that they can never compete with the American fresh article. While it is true that they may perhaps have some effect upon storage, it will be some years before even this can occur, if at all. The extremely small size of the Chinese eggs, their dirty, uninteresting color, together with the fact that under the best conditions they will be several months before being placed on the market bars them forever as a home article.

There is one thing that farmers do to eliminate any possibility from the importation of Chinese eggs or others of inferior quality, not excluding the cold storage stock. They can agitate and compel the passage of a law that will force each grower who is a case, or each country trader who sends cases to market to print upon each package a place from where the eggs were shipped. Then the law

should compel the proper labeling of Chinese or other eggs that are not strictly fresh. Such a law would be a big protection to the consumer and would aid the producer, for it would eliminate unjust competition.—Hyman H. Cohen in the Rural Spirit.

NEW PARCEL POST RATE.

Within less than a month after the Portland Commercial Club and allied organizations of the Northwest started a campaign for an extension of parcel post provisions, the postmaster general has issued an order that in future seeds, bulbs, cuttings, roots, scions and plants, in packages exceeding four ounces in weight, will be subject to parcel post zonal rates. In packages weighing four ounces or less, a flat rate of one cent per ounce will apply.

HUMAN MEMORY.

A Theory That the Soul, Not the Brain, Is Its Abiding Place.

In the American Magazine H. Ardington Bruce writes an article entitled "The Soul's Winning Fight With Science," in which he shows that science is no longer at war with man's belief in the immortality of the soul. In the course of the article appears the following interesting passage which tells of the memory:

"It is one of the fundamental tenets of modern physiology that every thought, every sensation, is accompanied by some change in the substance of the brain, and not only this, but that the brain stuff is constantly passing away and being replaced in such fashion that it has been estimated there is an entire renovation on an average of every seven years. How, then, no matter how much we strain the hypotheses of 'memory cells,' 'neural paths' and other material adjuncts to the memory process, can the new brain of the amnesic revive the memories belonging to the brain of fourteen years before?"

"For that matter, and quite apart from the 'poser' presented by amnesia of this prolonged character, the proved fact of brain stuff alteration is warrantably stressed by not a few animists as affording of itself sufficient evidence that the something which remembers is a something other than the brain. 'The old man of seventy,' observes one able critic of the materialistic doctrine—I had almost written dogma—'has usually many clear memories of his sayings and doings, of his thoughts and feelings when a little lad of ten. He has only to make an effort of the will and the past of long, long ago stands up ghostlike before him."

"In what compartment of his present brain had these images lain sleeping? In which hemisphere? In both or neither? And how came the images imprinted on the childish brain of ten to be passed on, in innumerable transmissions, through many successive brains, till they reached their last edition on the aged brain of seventy, or, rather, on the new brain of the aged man of seventy?"

"Finally, and most important question of all, where is that inexpressible entity which consciously and deliberately wills to resee, rehear and reel its memories of long ago?"

"Is it not the same entity—so far as any entity in the universe can be regarded as constant—that, with a different brain, first saw, heard and felt the actualities of which the memories have been transmitted to the brain with which it sees, hears and feels other actualities today? While the material brain changes, it—the seeing, hearing, feeling, thinking soul—remains."
