IRRIGATION CONGRESS ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS

Ask That Postal Savings Funds Be Invested in Irrigation District Bonds.

Denver, Colo.—With sectional lines on every vote closely drawn between the mineral and agricultural states and with the mining communities putting through all of their resolutions by a vote of 9 to 6, the Transmissouri irrigation conference adjourned here. Simultaneously the conference of western governors also adjourned, after deciding to oppose the Ferris land leasing bill, now pending in the lower house of congress.

Before adjournment, the irrigation conference gave voice to many demands, including the following:

That postal savings funds be invested in the bonds of irrigation districts.

That grants of non-mineral lands be made to states wherein there yet remain large tracts of the public domain, for the purpose of creating trust funds to be used on irrigation projects.

That grazing lands be thrown open to settlement in reasonably large tracts.

That congress grant relief to settlers in irrigation and reclamation districts, where projects have failed.

That the government take as compensation for its irrigation and reclamation work the bonds of the districts involved.

That governors of the 16 western states participating in the conference appoint a committee composed of three members from each state to form an interstate irrigation committee, to consider all projects and submit findings to the secretary of the interior, with recommendations concerning the government's connection, financial or otherwise, with the projects.

EXPLOSION, CARELESSNESS

Jury Says Men in Charge Should Be Held Criminally Liable.

The Dalles, Or.—After a probe covering four days Coroner Murget and jury who have been investigating the explosion on The Dalles-Celilo canal last week, when four were killed, reached a verdict that the fatal accident was due to the carelessness and inexperience of the men in charge of the powder work on the big project. The men in charge the jurors contend should be held criminally liable for the loss of lives. It is recommended that the federal war department investigate the explosion, learn who is responsible for the calamity and then no longer allow an "incompetent man to continue in this work and further endanger the lives of the hundreds of men who are working on the canal project."

TWO TRAIN ROBBERS CAUGHT AND BEATEN

Seattle.—One passenger was shot and two highwaymen were severely beaten when they attempted to hold up a Tacoma-bound interurban train near Riverton station, eight miles of Seattle Monday night. The robbers were captured and brought to a hospital in Seattle.

A terrible beating was given the two highwaymen.

That they were not successful was due to the presence of mind of J. Rose and F. Smith, employees of the traction company, who led the attack on the bandits.

The bandits boarded the train at Chicago avenue, in south Seattle. After the train had left the city limits the men masked themselves with handkerchiefs and started to rob the passengers. Commanding everyone to hold up his hands, Trew walked toward the smoking compartment. Just as he entered the compartment he turned and looked at his companion following him down the aisle. Trew turned his back to the men in the small room.

Smith, wielding a steel drill, hit Trew a stunning blow over the head. Immediately all the other men rushed to Smith's aid and in a short time both highwaymen were disarmed, lying bruised and bleeding on the floor.

McAdoo Wedding Is May 8. Washington.—Although there has been no formal announcements from the white house of the date of the wedding of Secretary McAdoo and Miss Eleanor R. Wilson, the youngest daughter of the president and Mrs. Wilson, friends who are in a position to know say Friday, May 8, has been tentatively selected.

Eye Grafting Succeeds.

Baltimore.—The success of the operation performed several weeks ago at the Baltimore eye, ear and throat hospital, in which the cornea of a pig's eye was grafted onto the blind eye of David Kane, a six months old infant, is now practically assured.

NEWS FROM OUR NATIONAL CAPITAL

Anti-Trust Legislation Will Be Curtailed at This Session of Congress.

Washington.—Anti-trust legislation supplementary to the Sherman act will not be undertaken at this session of congress on the broad scale originally outlined by the administration.

After many conferences of democratic and republican senators, who in turn have conferred with members of the house interstate and judiciary committees, a tentative amendment to the senate bill to create an interstate trade commission has been drawn, designed to take the place of proposed bills to prohibit or regulate interlocking directorates, holding companies, stock watering; to provide for government regulation of the issuance of railroad securities and to solve the problem of destructive price discrimination. It would provide that all these problems be referred to the proposed interstate trade commission, directing an exhaustive study of the subject for the information of congress.

Unqualified disapproval was expressed by President Wilson of the proposal in congress to curtail the anti-trust legislative programme for the session.

That opposition to carrying out the full trust legislative programme is growing among senate and house democrats continues in evidence, notwithstanding determination to revive the effort to perfect measures affecting interlocking directorates, holding companies, price discriminations and other evils.

Wilson Sustains Admiral in Tampico.

President Wilson thinks Admiral Mayo was fully justified in insisting sharply that the Mexican federalists at Tampico salute the American flag as reparation, in addition to apology, for the arrest of a United States navy paymaster and marines who had gone ashore to buy gasoline.

So far as President Huerta's repudiation of his Tampico subordinate's action in arresting Americans was concerned, President Wilson and Secretary Bryan had yet to decide between themselves whether it was sufficient.

Lind and Bryan Confer.

The presence in Washington of John Lind, President Wilson's personal representative in Mexico for the last eight months, gave the Washington government an adviser with special knowledge of the military situation at Tampico. Mr. Lind reached here from Vera Cruz aboard the presidential yacht Mayflower early Monday.

Treaty Not Construed, Says Bryan

Secretary Bryan in a statement reviews at length the Panama tolls question and in the course of the statement declares that the repeal of the tolls exemption in the Panama canal act "cannot be construed to be a construction of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty," but is "simply a refusal on the part of the United States to raise that question in that way."

Asserting that the opponents of the repeal have seized upon the charge that the president is "surrendering to England," Mr. Bryan declares that the opposition to the repeal has attempted to appeal "to prejudice rather than to reason."

"What has Great Britain done," he asked, "to justify the accusation that she is trying to dictate to this country? She has simply called attention to the terms of the treaty and asked for arbitration of the question of construction, in case this government differs from the British government in the construction to be placed on the language."

National Capital Brevities.

Ex-President Taft has gone to Augusta, Ga., to spend several weeks' vacation.

The democratic majority in the house voted to close the assay offices at Boise, Salt Lake and Deadwood on June 30.

Members of the house judiciary committee voted to censure Representative McDermott, of Illinois, in connection with the recent investigation of the lobby activity.

United States supreme court rules that private light and power companies may extend their plants beyond the city limits without gaining a franchise from the city concerned.

A clearing-house for pure food and drug information collected by the federal and state governments has been established by the department of agriculture.

Representative Henry of Texas introduced a resolution authorizing the investigation of steamship transportation of freight between Pacific and Atlantic ports in the effort to unmask the so-called trust.

Favorable vote has been taken by the interstate commerce commission on the Cummins bill providing for liability to full value for shipments on part of the railroads. Full damage for livestock was included in the amendments.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Plan to Secure Tourist Traffic.

Portland.—Officials of four trans-country railroads terminating in the northwest and representatives of commercial organizations in Portland, Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane held a conference here and planned a joint campaign to bring to the northwest as large a share as possible of the influx of eastern tourists expected on the Pacific coast next year.

The plan calls for the establishment of a permanent northwestern tourist and travel bureau at Chicago, which will act as a clearing house for all exploitation, publicity and advertising done by each of the northwest cities by each of the roads.

Fifty-Cent Pieces Bad.

Salem.—The police of Salem are looking for a mysterious woman, who has passed numerous counterfeit 50-cent pieces here.

It is not believed that the bogus money was made in this city or county, but the theory of the police is that the woman is a confederate of the counterfeiters and was sent here to dispose of as much of the bogus money as possible. All the coins were printed in the same mold and were made by an expert.

"Miss Fire" Facts Told.

The Dalles.—That in one single day he unearthed 20 "miss-fired" holes of dynamite, any one of which, had the "exploder" been struck, would have resulted in an explosion similar to the one which resulted in the disaster on The Dalles-Celilo canal works, when four were killed and as many injured, was the testimony of R. S. Morris before the coroner's jury which is investigating the cause of the explosion.

Held on Serious Charge at Condon.

Condon.—Bert Strickland, who says his home is at Gladstone, Or., was arrested here charged with setting fire to the Oregon hotel, which burned to the ground, causing one death and several serious injuries. He was arraigned before Justice Hollen and after considerable evidence had been given, was bound over to appear before the next session of the grand jury. His bond was fixed at \$4000.

MANY SEEKERS FOR OFFICE

Filing Time Ends with 258 Aspirants in the Race.

Salem.—Petitions and declarations of 258 aspirants for party nominations for state and district offices had been received by Secretary of State Olcott when the time for filing ended. The number sets a new record, and a score or more of exciting contests are assured.

Of the aspirants 199 are republicans, 44 are democrats and 15 are progressives. In 1910, 81 republicans and 23 democrats filed, and in 1912, 126 republicans and 58 democrats filed.

The increase in filings is due largely to an amendment of the primary law passed at the last session of the legislature providing for aspirants for all except county offices to file with the secretary of state. The change has greatly increased the work here and as a result Mr. Olcott has had day and night forces of clerks at work for more than a week and there still is a large amount of work to be done.

Of all the contests, that for governor promises to be the most exciting. There are 15 aspirants for party nominations, a new record, and all are actively engaged in campaign work.

Pendleton Man Draws Heavy Fine.

Pendleton.—John Estes, proprietor of a local pool hall, who recently paid a fine of \$250 for permitting gambling in his place of business, was fined \$500 by Judge Phelps for exhibiting obscene pictures. He had previously pleaded not guilty to the charge.

"Tick" Fever Is Fatal in Baker.

Baker.—Frank Gooding, 66 years old, died here of spotted or "tick" fever, the first death from this cause ever recorded here, according to Baker physicians. Gooding was bitten by a wood tick several weeks ago, but sought no medical advice until it was too late to help him.

Man Without Food a Week.

Marshfield.—Alone in the mountains seven days without food, G. Gilbert, a man between 50 and 60 years of age, was too weak to walk to safety when found in the Eden Ridge country and was cared for for two days before he was able to proceed.

Flavel to Get Yards and Docks.

Astoria.—Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern railway company, announced here that the proposed yards and docks of the Great Northern and North Pacific companies will be built at Flavel or "Tanny Point."
