The markings also failed to comply with the law which requires that the name of the contents shall be in large writing or print in a conspicuous place on the package; in this case it was in very small writing in one corner. Under the direction of the mayor, the box was taken down on the river bank, broken open, and found to contain a strong barrel holding 46 gallons of whiskey, which, according to the law, was spilled. It is understood that the loss falls on the shippers.—Sentinel.

Arctic Ducks and Geese.

So thickly do the birds come that nowadays a competent man with a shotgun has been known to secure as many as 600 ducks in a day."
