ability to perform the duties of the office to which he aspires. As postmaster at Newberg for four years he proved to be an efficient and accommodating public servant, and those who know him best believe that he will make an ideal county clerk. That he will get practically all the votes in this section goes without saying, and good reports are coming in of his canvass in other portions of the county.

S. C. Killen, editor and publisher of the Hillsboro Independent, announced last week that the Independent had just passed the forty-second milestone. The time was when the Independent was about as poor a publication as any that came to the Graphic exchange table, but Mr. Killen has made of it one of the best local papers published in the valley. Like some other papers of the same name however, it should be re-christened in order to be consistent.

There are a number of towns in Oregon that would do well to follow the example of Carlton and not rest content with one "clean-up day." Our neighbors over the hills to the west set apart a second day and made a "clean-up" of a shipment of a barrel of whiskey from a Portland house to the Carlton Pharmacy, the "package" not being marked in accordance with the state law governing the shipment of wet goods. YAMHILL COUNTY PROHIBITION PARTY RESOLUTIONS

Following are the resolutions adopted at the Prohibition convention held at McMinnville, April 22:

To the Prohibitionists of Yamhill county in convention assembled:

1. We congratulate the people of Yamhill county and of the state of Oregon, upon the great advance that is clearly noticeable to all in matters of moral reform. We rejoice that one of the great reforms for which the Prohibition party has stood for more than forty years, has come to pass in Oregon, to wit, the right accorded to women to exercise their franchise upon the same terms as men enjoy.

2. We are glad that the people of Oregon and the nation as well, have come to see the desirability of complete prohibition of the liquor traffic, that it ought to die and to get together to destroy it. We gladly extend the hand of fellowship to all such to join in the great movement in Oregon to win this year in the general election.

3. We extend our sincere congratulations to the loyal women of the W. C. T. U. for the splendid work they have performed in bringing public sentiment to its present advanced stage and we extend also our sincere sympathy in their recent loss from the death of State President Edith Hill Booker and their National President Mrs. Stevens. We pledge to the W. C. T. U. our cordial co-operation in their glorious efforts.

In view of the forthcoming state Prohibition convention to be held at Portland, May 5, and 6, and the assurance that a complete and competent platform will be adopted covering the needs and welfare of all parts of the state, we deem it desirable at this time not to make any definite presentation of a platform.

We stand with the "Out to Win" prohibition movement in the state, and we cordially invite into the comradeship of this movement all men and women who believe the liquor traffic ought to die.
