Prof. Hawkins was absent from school Wednesday of last week to attend the Yamhill county prohibition convention at McMinnville.

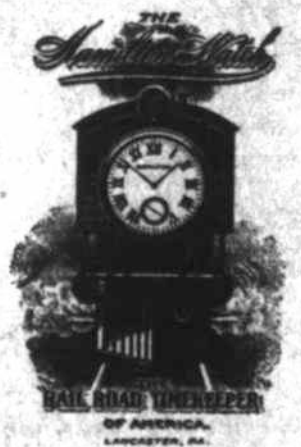
