NEWS FROM OUR NATIONAL CAPITAL

New York, Pennsylvania and Illinois Lead in Income and Corporation Excise.

Washington.—New York, Pennsylvania and Illinois paid more than half of the \$71,386,146 turned into the national treasury in income and corporation taxes during the fiscal year just closed. A detailed statement of collections made public showed that these three states contributed \$37,931,717.

New York alone paid \$12,528,247.03 in individual income tax, while the entire amount paid by individuals throughout the country was \$28,306,336.69. The empire state paid \$9,766,248.57 of the \$43,079,810.44 paid as corporation tax by all states.

Pennsylvania ranked second in both individual and corporation taxes. Its corporations paid \$6,096,305.28 and its individual income tax collections amounted to \$3,176,095.28. Illinois was third in the list, with corporation taxes amounting to \$4,293,649.68 and individual incomes aggregating \$2,076,171.11.

3 Federal Board Choices Confirmed.

Three of the members of the federal reserve board nominated by the president—Charles S. Hamlin, W. P. G. Harding and A. C. Miller—were confirmed by the senate.

The nominations of Paul M. Warburg, of New York, and Thomas D. Jones, of Chicago, have not been acted upon by the banking and currency committee and probably will not be before the end of the week.

Messrs. Hamlin, Miller and Harding take the oath of office within a few days, and the work of setting in motion the new federal banking system can begin at once. The secretary of the treasury and controller of the currency are ex-officio members of the board, which consists of seven members. The five will constitute a quorum to do practically all preliminary business.

Borah Continues to Fight Harbor Bill.

There is little likelihood that the fight being made against the river and harbor bill in the senate will accomplish its defeat, though it is believed that the bill cannot go into effect much before August and may not become operative until a later date.

Senator Borah, of Idaho, who is holding up the bill, intends to hold up the conference report later, unless congress grants some of the legislation asked by the west. As a means of accomplishing his purpose, he has offered an amendment to the bill authorizing a loan of \$50,000,000 to the reclamation fund, and is demanding that that amendment be accepted by the senate. His contention is that the river and harbor bill, with few exceptions, carries no direct benefit to the states, where the government is building irrigation works.

Colombian Treaty is Likely to Fail.

The administration by a party vote will be able to secure a favorable report from the foreign relations committee of the senate on the Bryan treaty with Colombia, but senators opposed to that document assert positively that the administration will not be able to force ratification by the senate. It requires a two-thirds vote to ratify and more than a third of the senate are said to be opposed to the treaty.

National Capital Briefs.

Major General Wood, former chief of staff of the United States army, has been ordered in command of the eastern department of the army.

In a wordy altercation over the Nicaragua treaty before the foreign relations committee, Senators Root of New York and Smith of Michigan nearly came to blows.

It is said that leaders are hoping that a vote on the Hobson prohibition amendment to the constitution will be had in the house about August 1.

The United States has been asked by Consul General Cheehre of Canton, China, to send aid for the 2,000,000 people who are said to have been rendered destitute by the recent floods in two southern provinces of China.

The house passed the bill repealing the provision that anyone who was in any way active on the side of the rebels during the civil war should not be eligible for the collection of claims from the government. Claims totaling \$165,000,000 will thus be revived, it is said.

President Wilson will fill all vacancies where negroes are now employed by other negroes, in accordance with a promise which he made about the time of his inauguration. White men will not take the places of the blacks.

The San Dominican situation continues to be a puzzle for President Wilson. He admits having received a report that the American gunboat Machias had fired on one of the warring factions because they had violated an agreement not to bombard the rebel city.

OREGON ROBBERS MAKE CONFESSION

Two of Three Men Who Held Up O.-W. R. & N. Train Captured Near La Grande.

Pendleton, Or.—Albert Meadows and Clarence Stoner, two of the three train robbers who held up O.-W. R. & N. train No. 5 near Meacham the morning of July 2, were arrested Saturday night about 9 o'clock by Deputy Sheriff Batchelor, of La Grande.

The leader of the gang, who was shot and killed by Deputy Sheriff George McDuffy at the time of the holdup is Charles Manning, a professional gambler and not Hugh Whitney, the notorious outlaw. All three of the robbers were from Cokeville, Wyo. Manning has a wife and four children in Cokeville. He was a close personal friend of both Hugh and Charles Whitney, while Stoner is a cousin of the Whitney boys.

When arrested the two train robbers were walking along the railroad track in the direction of La Grande and less than 20 miles from the scene of the holdup. Neither man was armed and they offered no resistance when placed under arrest. They had \$385 in cash and the \$700 diamond ring taken from H. B. Royce, the Walla Walla brewer, who was a passenger on the train, and a smaller diamond, but the diamonds were thrown away when they were arrested to prevent their being used to connect them with the holdup.

GRAIN YIELD WILL BE LARGE

Wheat Crop of Pacific Northwest Estimated at 65,000,000 Bushels.

Portland, Or.—The season is now far enough advanced to make it almost certain that the cereal crops of the Pacific northwest will be safely gathered. The progress also is sufficient to enable grain men to estimate with a degree of closeness the yields of the leading grains.

That the wheat crop of the three states will break all previous records is conceded by nearly every grain authority in the northwest. The general estimate now is 65,000,000 bushels for Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

DEATH DEALING BOMB WRECKS TENEMENT

New York.—In the ruins of the tenement wrecked by the explosion of a bomb, which it is believed was intended for use against John D. Rockefeller or his son, the authorities found evidence that Arthur Caron, who was killed with three others, had used his apartment as a center for the distribution of inflammatory literature, and that it was filled with death-dealing explosives.

A small printing press, revolutionary pamphlets and circulars, an electric dynamo, two electric batteries, cartridges and bits of steel were among the articles uncovered, which tend, in the opinion of the police, to show an anarchist plot. That the demonstration, halted by the bungling of some one who was preparing an internal machine for its mission, was planned against the Rockefeller family in Tarrytown, is the theory on which the authorities are working.

Two of those killed in the wrecked apartment were prominent agitators who were to be placed on trial at Tarrytown on the charges of disorderly conduct in connection with the mourning inaugurated against John D. Rockefeller, Jr., as a protest against his attitude in the Colorado mine strike.
