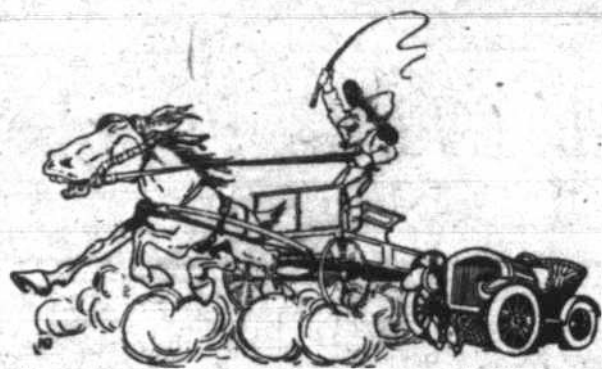

Census Reports Take Time.
