H. A. GRAFE DECEASED

The following notice of the life and death of H. A. Grafe, formerly of Newberg, is taken from the Albany Democrat:

The death of H. A. Grafe, July 1, marked the passing of more than an ordinary man. In brief, this is his life story: Born in Germany, November 4, 1840, came to America with his parents when eight years of age. His mother died in quarantine in New York harbor. Soon after reaching the United States he was placed in an orphan asylum and was not long after adopted into the home of a New York farmer. The new home was a hard one and the orphan lad's duties were heavy for one so young. During the years of his childhood and youth he worked for his board and clothing, with a bit of schooling thrown in. Herman was a thoughtful and studious boy, and while his advantages were poor, he improved them diligently. While yet in his teens he found his way to Wisconsin and became a student in Laurence University. Upon leaving this institution he followed teaching for several years. He had also given considerable time to the study of music and when teaching in the public schools, he became also a teacher of vocal music, holding his classes of evenings in school houses, churches or halls. To the time of his death he took a deep interest in music, trying to interest the young wherever he lived in singing.

November 30, 1871, he was united to Miss Elizabeth Cook, of Wabasha, Minnesota. The year following his marriage he homesteaded in Pope county, Minnesota. This homestead was the family home until 1899, when he moved to Newberg, Oregon. At Newberg, he engaged in the flour milling business, which he continued for 11 years. Four years ago he moved to Gates, Oregon, where he lived till the time of his death.

During his residence in Minnesota Mr. Grafe held various township and county offices and served two terms in the Minnesota state senate. He held membership in the Ma-

sonic order for over 40 years.

To Mr. and Mrs. Grafe were born six children, four of whom and the mother are living and were with him at the end. The children, Miss Bessie and LeRoy, of Gates; Mrs. H. R. Patterson, of Newberg, and Mrs. Lowell Bristow, of Tillamook City. At the time of his death, Mr. Grafe was an elder in the Presbyterian church at Gates.

June 21 he was stricken with paralysis and on July 1 he peacefully passed away to his reward. Mr. Grafe had reached the evening of life and the reaper's sickle gathers a ripened sheaf. There are many saddened at his death, yet his going was but the normal thing. He leaves a clean record; he suffered some wrongs in his early life and some perhaps in later years, but no man can truly say that Herman Grafe wronged him. In spite of the serious handicap of his boyhood, he became an intelligent man, a forceful character, and a model citizen. J. Edward Blair.
