THE FRIENDLY GUIDE BOARD.

In a recent trip made over the most excellent roads of Tillamook county, the writer was surprised to see the almost universal lack of guide boards at the cross roads. There were a few to point the way to the traveler, but without the guide book put out by the Portland Auto Club we would many times have been at a loss to know which way to turn.

The same difficulty is met with all over the state, though county courts could provide road signs at a cost that the tax payers would gladly pay.

The Lake county court is making such provision, as will be seen from the following taken from the Lakeview Examiner:

A set of metal road signs to be used on the Central Oregon Highway has arrived and will soon be erected under the direction of County Judge Daly. They are 21 in number for the highway proper, through Lake County with various others for intersecting roads, danger signals for bad places and a few of the more important cross-roads points in the county.

The signs are of heavy ingot steel of a black color, with the lettering drilled in and showing in steel gray color and glittering brightly in the gleam of auto lights at night. To catch the gleam of auto lights they must stand about six to seven feet above the ground. A plate and brace are fastened to the bottom of each, to be set three feet under ground and at some future time the county court will have concrete imbedded at the surface to hold the signs erect, they otherwise being entirely indestructible.

In addition the County Court has provided wooden signs at less important crossings of county roads through the county, where such do not cross nor lead to the Across-State Highway.

OBITUARY

Jacob Hartman was born in Germany, February 6, 1839. He came to America when a young man, and at the breaking out of the civil war enlisted in Company H, Eighteenth Missouri Infantry, September 7, 1861. He was honorably discharged at Chattanooga, Tennessee, November 13, 1864, after more than three years of faithful service. In 1912 he came to Newberg, and died here July 28, 1914. He was a member of Shiloh Post, Grand Army of the Republic, and his funeral was attended by the post and W. R. C. Interment was in the G. A. R. cemetery. He leaves a widow.
