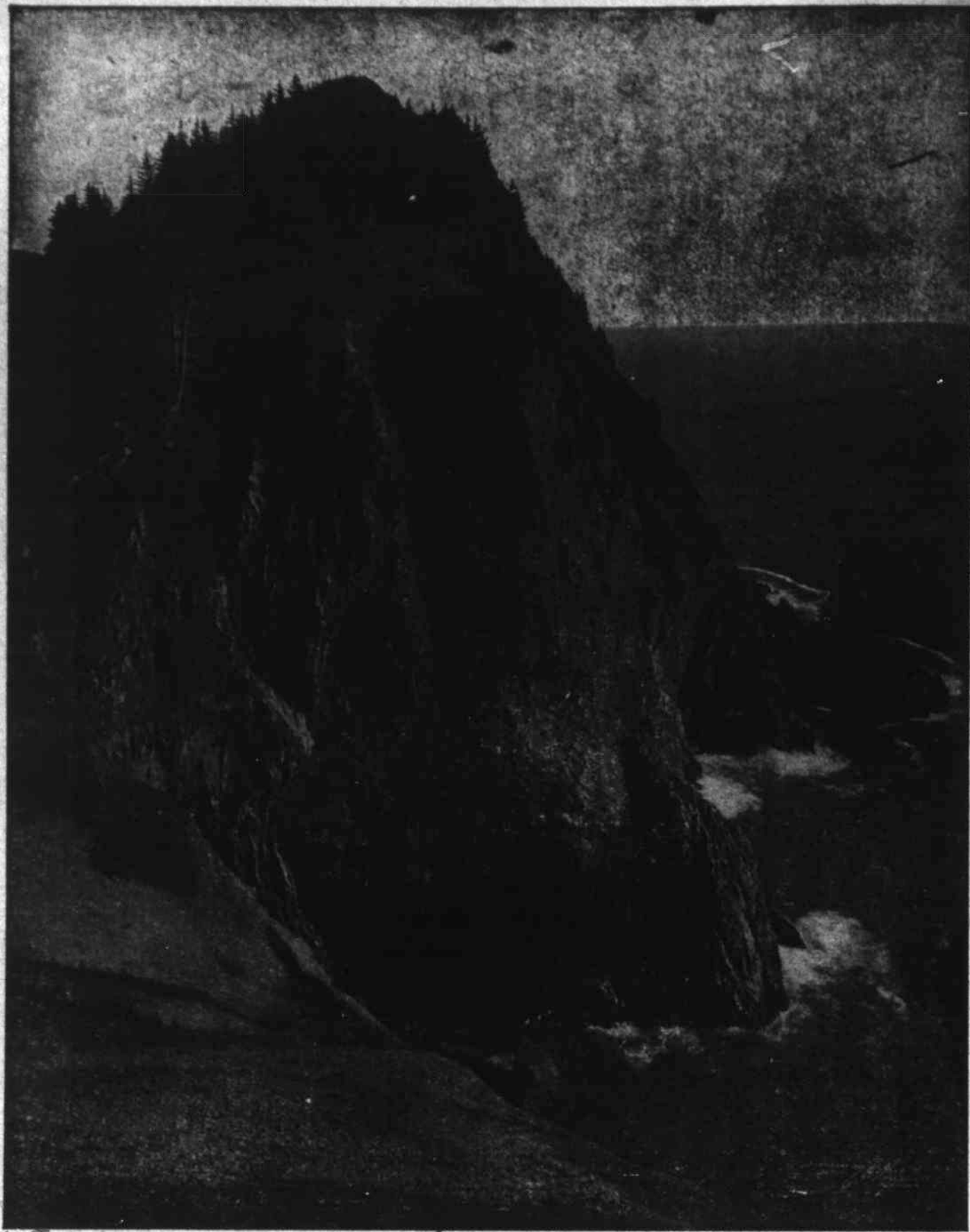




Neah-Kah-Nie Mountain

TRIP TO TILLAMOOK

SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING, JULY 24

Geo. Crites having given up his contract on the property burned, and it being considered a menace as it stands, the recorder was instructed to notify the owner to have the building removed.

An ordinance repealing the ordinance for the park bonds, and making a new issue, was read. The bonds are to be offered in the open market, the same being for the purpose of taking up the previous issue. Ordinance passed.

Claims to the amount of \$42.15 for cutting weeds and grass were allowed. The men who have been doing the work, have got better jobs and have quit, leaving considerable grass still uncut.

The street committee reported many cement walks needed. A petition from residents of Fifth street from Main street east to the west side of Blaine, asking for concrete pavement was granted.

Residents on the west end of First street complained they had no fire protection. Committee instructed to look into the matter.

Complaints of residents in regard to water closets reported, and as many have been notified, especially one within a block of First street, the same to be reported to the health officer and to be condemned and owners to be forced to connect with sewer.

The improvement of East Second street again came before the council and all former proceedings revoked and a new start made.

He offers one acre of ground and pipe-line right-of-way for \$3,000, the city to assume responsibility regarding any riparian rights. The water committee is to report at the next meeting.
