George H. Himes of the Oregon Historical Society was a welcome visitor at the Graphic office Wednesday. He came out from Portland to get information from Hon. J. C. Nelson respecting the names of the men who composed Cap. Phil Thompson's company, which fought in the Cayuse Indian war of 1848. Mr. Nelson was a member of the company and out of a list of 52 men he was able to give the names of 44. There were two other Indian wars waged in the Northwest, the Rogue River war, 1851-3 and the Yakima war, 1856-7. Mr. Himes went from here to see John Crawford to get other information of a historical nature.

It was an exceedingly interesting and animated conversation that took place in front of the Graphic office Tuesday morning. Four mutes from Portland, Craven, Reedman, Lynch and Kautz, respectively, who were on their way to Tillamook by auto for a fishing trip, made a short stop here. They hailed Francis Brickley, the Graphic compositor who also uses the sign language, and the wireless was put into action at once. It may have been a discussion of the various kinds of tackle and bait best suited to tempt the many varieties of fish that are found in the Tillamook waters, and again the conversation may have turned on the comparative strength of the armies and navies of the European nations now in the throes of a great war—anyway it was rapid fire, well punctuated by exclamation points, and when it was over it was over, and no back talk.
