Mr. Macy's hearse had been painted by Jack Linn and removed from the paint shop the day before the McGuire house burned, and Mr. Tilbury was to have placed his hearse for repainting the next day. A narrow escape at both ends.

D. M. Smith, of this city, and Dr. S. J. Mann, of Bandon, have returned from their trip to the Deschutes Valley. They went by auto, crossing the Cascades via the Mackenzie river, and found the road rough in some sections. Crops in the Deschutes valley have been backward owing to the unusually cold season, there being frosts almost every morning. The hay crop is fair. Dr. Mann was the physician who two years ago succeeded in preserving the life of a man who was badly scalded in an accident on the C. & E. railroad, whereby it became necessary to skin graft about two-thirds of his body. The operation required about seventeen months for the man's recovery, and the doctor used over two thousand yards of gauze, and about two hundred persons contributed of their cuticle to restore the afflicted man. The case is one of the most remarkable of its kind on record.

Threshing the new wheat crop has been in progress during the last week. The yield is reported from twenty-five to thirty-five bushels per acre. The most productive section thus far heard from is that of Bellevue, where there is a very progressive class of farmers. The Houck flouring mills up to yesterday had taken in about two thousand bushels of very good quality. The price for new wheat is now 75 cents. The early oat crop is reported as good, but that sown late was cut short by the dry weather.

Clover seed will not come up to the usual yield and is not of the highest quality. This is attributed to both the dry weather and the ravages of the clover midge. Certain clover fields which were very promising early in the season are proving to have been damaged by the hot weather.
