REDUCTION IN WAGES MADE NECESSARY

The following is an exact copy of notices posted by the Chas. K. Spaulding Logging Co. effective October 1, 1914:

Owing to the serious depression of business in general and especially in the lumber market, The Chas. K. Spaulding Logging Co. have decided to make a reduction in wages, covering their entire operations, as follows:

All employees receiving 20 cents per hour or less, 5 per cent.
All employees receiving over 20 cents per hour, 10 per cent.

On account of State Compensation Tax, all employees now receiving salaries, in the future, will be put upon hourly time and receive pay for time worked only.

We regret very much that conditions compel us to pursue this course and trust that our employees will receive same in the proper spirit, with the assurance on our part that as soon as conditions will justify, the normal scale will be resumed.
