"PLEASE EXCUSE MARY."

Every teacher knows the value of punctuality and regular attendance at school, but parents sometimes show an ignorance or an indifference to the matter that seriously cripples the efficiency of the schools.

"Please let Robert come home to-day after his recitations are

over," runs the note that the teacher receives. Or, "Please excuse Mary for her absence yesterday; she had to go to the dressmaker." Or, "Please excuse Elizabeth for tardiness; she was out late at a party last night." Or, "Please excuse my children the rest of the week; we are going to visit my sister."

When parents make such requests as these, the teacher is helpless, although she very well knows that if Robert does not study in school he will not study at all, and although she has her own ideas about late hours for school children, and about taking days from school to visit dressmakers and aunts. Moreover, she knows that many of the excuses originate wholly with the pupils, and that the parents realize when they write the notes that the reasons are insufficient.

Nowhere in life does being "on the job" count more than in school work. Even the brightest and most earnest pupils cannot get back all that they lose if they are frequently late, absent, or dismissed, although the bright and earnest pupils are better able to stand the loss than those who, being less bright or less earnest, have lower scholarship marks. A perfect record in school attendance is one of the best recommendations that a boy or a girl can offer a prospective employer.

The actual loss in school work is not the whole of the story. Punctuality is a cardinal virtue, the habit of which is formed and fixed in early life or not at all. Parents do their children a positive injury when they belittle this virtue by condoning tardiness that is not absolutely necessary.

Parents and teachers can cooperate to no better purpose than in promoting prompt and regular attendance on the part of the children.—The Youth's Companion.

SCHOLLS GRANGE WILL HOLD FAIR

Scholls Grange, Patrons of Husbandry, have completed all arrangements for their annual fair, which will be held at Scholls, Friday and Saturday, October 16 and 17. This year the livestock exhibit is receiving a great deal of attention, and this will include horses, cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, as well as poultry. Some good premiums will be given for winning entries in all classes, and that there will be a good lot of individuals in the contest goes without saying.

The two days' milk cow contest is creating considerable diversion—and this is a feature that is well worth while. The state dairy commissioner will be present to direct the proceedings.

All livestock must be tested for tuberculosis, and this has already been arranged for.

VAN BRAKLE CASE SOME MORE

The county medical association tried to oust Dr. Van Brakle again last week by a complaint to the state board that he had no right to make medical examinations for marriage certificates, but the state board turned it down, four to one.

But now the state board has filed an appeal to the state supreme court from the recent decision of Judge Campbell, and the case will go on.

Dr. Van Brakle says he welcomes the appeal, and that the matter will now go to the highest court in the U. S. if necessary to determine the rights of osteopaths to hold medical offices.—Oregon City Courier.

MORE CATTLE EXPERTS WANTED

A movement has been started by the Oregon Jersey Cattle Club to induce the government, through the Bureau of Animal Industry, to send three or four experts into this state to assist in the work of inspecting the herds as a safeguard against tuberculosis. Under a state law inspection of cattle for indications of disease has extended all over the state, but the great increase in the size and number of the herds is rapidly overtaking the state force. All the registered herds of Jerseys in the state are said to be entirely healthy at the present time and it is desired, by more thorough inspection, to avoid all possibility of infection.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

In the matter of the sidewalk ordinance and resolution, there were many remonstrances and some errors. After much discussion it was decided that the street committee go over the ground again and order in such walks as were absolutely necessary, only, and when so ordered in they are to be laid without further consideration. The walk ordered in on the east side of Dayton Avenue was an error and it should have read the west side.

The proposal to convert a part of the city hall basement into a rest room for women was deferred until later. The bill for pumping at the Otis spring was questioned and tabled.

Clarence Coe, fire chief, appeared before the council and asked that some chemical apparatus be purchased, as the use of water often causes all damage done. The motion was regularly put and carried that Mr. Coe be allowed to buy the necessary chemical extinguishers.

The traffic ordinance was amended so as prevent passage of vehicles between the cars and curb while trains are standing at the station.

A. C. Stanbrough, chairman of the library board, appeared before the council and asked that the second \$500 of the library fund be paid. There was some talk of a special levy to cover this fund but nothing was done. The appointment of Mrs. Jennie Silver as one of the library board was confirmed by the council.

Neither of the contractors to whom the award for street improvement was made having signed the contracts there was some fear expressed lest the improvement be delayed until the weather is too bad to do anything. Council meets again October 19.
