PACIFIC COLLEGE ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN

During the past six months a campaign has been on to raise an endowment of \$100,000 for Pacific College, the bulk of the work being done by President Pennington.

In order to get the situation before the business men of Newberg a banquet was given at the Imperial hotel Tuesday evening, there being present besides a few members of the Board, L. M. Parker, Clarence Butt, J. L. Van Blaricom, S. A. Mills, R. J. Moore, W. S. Wharton, G. O. Bassett, J. T. Bell, W. T. Anderson, J. C. Porter, D. D. Coulson, E. C. Baird, Dr. Geo. Larkin.

A full statement of the situation in which it was shown that \$65,000 has been subscribed, leaving \$35,000 yet to be raised. Of the amount subscribed \$10,000 was offered by J. J. Hill on condition that the full amount be raised by January 1, 1915. Mr. Pennington stated that he intended to go East in a short time to see what could be done, but impressed those present with the necessity for the home people to do their best first, as it would be impossible to secure any large amount there.

Following a free discussion of the matter a committee, composed of W. S. Wharton, Dr. Geo. Larkin, E. C. Baird, Clarence Butt, G. O. Bassett was appointed to present it to the Commercial Club and ask for cooperation.

He was only about fifteen feet away and the full charge entered the upper part of the thigh from behind, ploughing a hole through the fleshy part as indicated above.
