Improvements, Factories and Enterprises That Will Give Employment to Labor.

The Douglas County Creamery has installed an ice manufacturing plant of its own.

The Warren Construction Co. is rushing a big job of paving at Marshfield to close it before the rainy season sets in.

Plans are being prepared for a group of bridges to be built over the Celilo Canal.

The heating contract for the new building at the University of Oregon was awarded to a Portland firm at a price \$200 higher than a contractor from outside the state in order to favor Oregon material and construction.

The new post office building to be erected at Coquille will cost \$6000.

The Seattle Times says, "it seems incredible that the people of the state of Washington should be so crazy as to adopt the proposed eight-hour bill." The same statement applies equally well to Oregon for if the bill passes here it would kill our industrial development indefinitely.

Enterprise is getting a sawmill and logging railroad that will employ 1500 men under good business conditions.

The Otis Elevator Co., of Portland, will install the largest battery of elevators on the coast in the new Meier & Frank building in Portland.

The new railroad from Airle to the Siletz timber is completed. Roseburg will vote on a \$500,000 bond issue for a municipal railroad.

Sheridan has opened a cannery to care for product of 250 fruit farms.

Lane county is laying Macadam road at \$5,778 per mile.

A new Presbyterian church has just been dedicated at Gold Beach, Curry county.

Prof. Bradley Stoughton, on "The Corrosion of Iron and Steel."—Engineering Magazine, July, 1911:

In short, manganese is only one, although perhaps one of the worst, of the evils we have to contend with. We should expect to find that the most resistant metal would be the one which was most homogenous in composition, and because the less the amount of impurity the less opportunity there is for uneven distribution of it, we should expect that the purer the metal the more resistant it will prove to be. Both of these theories are borne out by the facts, as we know them, and it has been found good practice to reduce all impurities, not only manganese, but sulphur, silicon, carbon, and also gases, which may occur combined with the metal, occluded in it, or separated in the form of blow-holes.
