On Monday evening Miss Grace Wilson, of Los Angeles, gave a lecture at the Dundee church on the Panama Pacific Exposition. Miss Wilson has been taking a pleasure trip around the world, and, being a loyal Californian, has lectured wherever she has had an opportunity on the great fair to open in San Francisco next February. Combining a pleasing personality and the enthusiasm always to be found in a resident of the Golden state, Miss Wilson had no difficulty in convincing her hearers that they desired to attend the exposition. She spoke at length of the three words most in evidence in all the talk of the exposition management, "Universal, Contemporaneous, and Brotherhood," and showed how these three ideas are being carried out in all the various departments. All other expositions held in the United States have been in commemoration of some historical event more or less remote while the Panama Pacific Exposition celebrates an event in contemporaneous history. For that reason no awards are to be given to inventions and scientific discoveries more than ten years old. The idea of brotherhood and universality is carried out even in the arrangement of the buildings where the court of the Universe is the connecting link of the courts of the Occident and the Orient. In "the Lone" will be found the concessions and amusement features in general which, like the rest of the fair, are to be considerably different from the "Midway" of Chicago on the "Trail" of the Lewis and Clark fair. From over four thousand applications for space in the Lone the management has chosen some four hundred or more largely educational in nature such as the replica of the Panama Canal, The Grand Canon of Colorado, and the Canadian Ice Palace. The lighting of the fair grounds will be one of the unique features. Although the buildings and grounds

will be better lighted than those of any previous exposition, every electric bulb will be concealed, thus giving a reflected light. Miss Wilson recommended an immediate beginning on saving the pennies for a trip to this fairy land. Before the lecture a short musical and literary program was enjoyed. A song by the congregation was followed by a reading by Miss Bingham. Then one of the Dundee male quartettes consisting of Messrs. Scott Liven-good, David Marr, Elmo Shannahan and Earl Alford favored the company with a selection.
