THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON WINS MEDAL

The twenty-second annual State Inter-Collegiate Oratorical Contest was held at McMinnville last Friday evening, March 12. Of the eight colleges competing in this contest, Mr. Victor Morris, of the University of Oregon, was awarded first place, the title of his oration being "Democracy and World Peace." Mr. Edward Livingston, of Pacific University, received second honors, and Mr. M. C. Smithson, of McMinnville, was given third place. The contest was remarkable in that six of the eight orations were on the subject of peace, and also because the competitors were all men. This is the first time in several years that this has happened.

Music for the occasion was furnished by the McMinnville College Orchestra, the Girls' Glee Club and by a male chorus. The Girls' Glee Club was especially good, and the rest of the musical numbers, both in the contest and afterward at the banquet, were greatly enjoyed.

Mr. Walter Wilson, Pacific College's representative, delivered his oration very creditably and in the minds of many present should have received a higher ranking than he did. Mr. Wilson was backed by a splendid delegation of thirty students and faculty from P. C.

The contest was held in the Imperial Theatre and the banquet in the First Baptist church. Prof. J. Sherman Wallace presided as toastmaster at the banquet. Mr. H. H. Haworth '15 responded to the toast "College Fellowship."
