The Newberg schools are closing this week one of the most successful year's work in their history. While the attendance in the grades has not been quite as large as last year, the high school enrollment has been considerably larger.

The closing program for the year began last Thursday evening with an exhibit by the Manual Training, Domestic Science and Domestic Art classes. This exhibit, held at the high school building, called forth many favorable comments from the large number of people who visited it during the evening.

The Baccalaureate sermon was preached on Sunday evening by President Pennington of Pacific College at the Friends church. The capacity of the building was overtaxed, many failing to find room for admittance. The sermon of the evening was a plain and eloquent appeal to the forty young people composing the class to make the best use of their abilities and their opportunities in the service of humanity.

The junior class play, "What Happened to Jones," was given before a large and appreciative audience Tuesday evening. The juniors impersonated the various characters very acceptably and kept the audience in a roar of laughter much of the time.

The Senior Class Day exercises on Wednesday and Commencement on Thursday, with the address to the class given by President Ackerman, of the State Normal, will close the year's work.

Many of the class have been prominent in student activities, athletics, on the staff of the "Chehalem," the school annual, and as members of the debate teams which have met other high schools of the state.
