William Jennings Bryan has resigned his important position as Secretary of State and is now a private citizen. The break between Bryan and President Wilson came over a disagreement of the policy of the government toward Germany. There is a fear expressed among democrats lest Mr. Bryan may now become the Teddy Roosevelt of the party and cause it's disruption.

Word comes from Washington that there is a possibility of the appointment by President Wilson of some republican as Secretary of State, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of W. J. Bryan, and the names of Taft, Root and Knox have been mentioned as possibilities. We have no idea that any one of these men would accept the place, and we doubt the wisdom of the appointment of any republican to this important position in the cabinet at this time. While a republican might be appointed who would work in harmony with Wilson and the members of the cabinet on the war question, it would be almost a certainty that he would not fall in line with the majority on many other questions of moment, and discord would naturally follow. What the country wants at this critical time is a body of strong men to back up the president and help steer the ship of state clear of shoals.

After the fire in Portland, which occurred some weeks ago, in which the paper house of The Blake, McFall Co., suffered a loss of nearly \$200,000, the statement was made in the papers that a searching investigation would be made to determine, if possible, the origin of the fire. The company is now back in the same building, which will be occupied until the new building being erected on the east side of the river is ready for occupancy, and there is posted on the wall on

the first floor a notice to the effect that the fire originated from a cigarette, and warning is given that smoking in the building by any employe will mean immediate dismissal. Smoking in the building was against the rules before the fire, but some cigarette fiend evidently broke the rule when the boss was not in sight, and a big fortune went up in smoke as a result. As an all-round public nuisance, non-greater than the cigarette smoker has yet been located.

In 1914 Oregon pulled through a storm of radical legislative propositions that until they were settled suspended all industrial activities.

Fortunately the 25 legislative experiments that were to be tried out by the enthusiastic advocates of everything new under the sun were all defeated.

The legislature got a sane slant and took up none of the defeated idiosyncracies and submitted no new nostrums for the body politic to put to a popular vote, and enacted none.

But now comes Mr. U'Ren with a new Single Tax campaign and announces that if he does not succeed he will force this question on the people at four more elections.

Mr. Spence puts resolutions through the state grange of which he is the head and master to abolish the legislature and have a commission of one body in continuous session.

The Tax Liberator shows how taxes have gone up 410 per cent in eight years and how all the money in circulation circulates at the tax collectors office.

During all this time Oregon has had oodles of reformers and reforms of the U'Ren-Spence type in both parties, and we have regulated industries to a fare-you-well.

Reformers and reform laws have not prevented taxes going skyward and business from going to hallelujah and money is harder to borrow in Oregon than any western state.

The state has been long on

politics and short on administrative efficiency and voters should hesitate about signing up petitions for the new nostrums.

We need a good long holiday from political agitation and a chance for the commonwealth to get its breath and for business to have at least an even break.

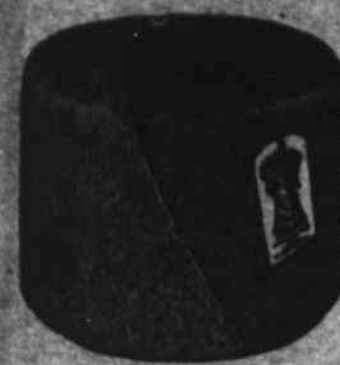
