PORTLAND INDUSTRIAL NOTES

The Brownsville Woolen Mills have taken over the entire building at the southwest corner of Third and Morrison streets. It is being remodeled to provide space for their modern wholesale tailoring plant on the upper floors. J. L. Bowman, the president of this concern, states that when the new plant is in operation by March 1st, there will be an average of 1,000 made-to-measure suits for men and young men produced each week. In addition to catering to the five retail stores in Oregon belonging to the Brownsville Woolen Mills, samples are being distributed among 200 agents in the Pacific Northwest. From these samples orders will be taken which will be manufactured in Portland. It is estimated that at least \$25,000,000 worth of wholesale tailoring orders are shipped East every year. The past two years he has been gradually increasing the output along these lines until the above mentioned capacity has been reached. Mr. Bowman estimates that his payroll in the shops will be at least \$5,000 a week the year round, as during the slack period he expects to keep his employees busy manufacturing ready-to-wear garments for the retail stores of the Brownsville Woolen Mills.

President Bowman declares that others may profitably engage in this industry, as there is a large demand for this class of merchandise, which is now being shipped in from the East. Naturally, the more plants started in Portland the more skilled labor will be developed. Mr. Bowman states that it would require at least 20 plants the size of his enlarged plant which will be started March 1st, to care for the volume of business if Portland can become a tailoring center to supply the Pacific Northwest, and he is willing to give advice based on the benefits of his experiences along these lines to any Eastern concerns desirous of finding one of the profitable fields of merchandising in the United States—Chamber of Commerce Bulletin.
