

LEADERS' CONFERENCE

The prayer meeting committee of the Young People's Union have made arrangements for a leaders' conference, to be held in the Christian church next Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Lloyd Carrick, president of the Portland union, will be there to address the meeting, and it is especially desired by the committee that all the leaders whose names appear on the topic cards of the different societies be out to hear Mr. Carrick. Three-minute talks will be given by members of the different societies, as follows:

Baptist—Why separate prayer meeting for young people?

Methodist—Prayer meeting runs.

Friends—Hints to leaders.

We also have three musical numbers, furnished by the Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist societies. The prayer meeting committee also advises that the Friends society has made a call for a leader for some other society, and Lester Jones of the Christian church will supply. This is a good move and it will make it possible for us to get better acquainted with the methods of conducting ser-

vices in the different societies.

Six of the executive board of our union, together with Revs. Whitely and Lee, went to McMinnville last Friday evening to hear Evangelist Bruce Evans, who is conducting a union revival service at that place. We found a full house, lots of enthusiasm and heard a good gospel message. There is some talk between the ministerial board and the officers of the union of having a revival service under the auspices of the union. However, no official action has been taken as yet. Let us be wide awake and ready to respond to any special service to which we are called by our officers and leaders of the various committees. There will be no attendance contest for the banner at the Sunday afternoon meeting, but we want every member of the union and other young people to be there.

HARMONY IN THE HOOSIER STATE

A FACTOR FOR WORLD PEACE

In 1898 Italy organized a Cosmopolitan Club among the foreign students in its universities, later joining forces with the universities of Europe. Ten years ago clubs of students of different races were started at Cornell and the University of Wisconsin. Now these European and American organizations have united and have met in the United States as an International Congress of Students. Local Societies of these Cosmopolitan Clubs have been formed in twenty-six American universities. At one club meeting thirteen different national songs were sung in their original tongue. Each member of the chorus learned the tune of twelve national airs besides his own and memorized the words of all of them, Russian, Chinese, Hawaiian, Japanese and those of Western European nations. It was an impressive spectacle when these thirteen students marched out on the platform each dressed in his native costume, the Mexican with his sombrero, the Chinese in his silk robe, the Hollander with his wooden shoes and wide trousers and the Scotchman with his kilts. "Rule Britannia," "Hawaii ponoi," "Mexicanos al grito," "Wacht am Rhein," and eight other national songs succeeded each other, ending with "America."—From The People's Home Journal for March.
