He said he had been having difficulty in getting farmers interested in corn growing in some sections of the county and he felt sure that a corn fair would stimulate interest that would prove helpful. He thinks corn may be grown with profit in the Willamette Valley.

Dr. John S. Rankin, the city health officer, recently sent samples of our city water to Dr. D. N. Roberg, the state health officer for examination and a report from the latter shows for the Snyder spring 300 bacteria per cubic centimeter and for the Oliver spring 350 bacteria per cubic centimeter. Neither sample showed any gas or colon bacilli, following 72 hours incubation. The test is considered very high and consequently quite satisfactory as there is no evidence of typhoid.

The knowledge of the high price of sugar had a very distressing effect on the mind of S. P. Timberlake of the Transfer Co. Tuesday. He loaded a shipment of 150 sacks of sugar on his wagons to haul out to the Springbrook cannery, and all went well until a count was made of the sacks at the cannery, when there was a shrinkage of one sack. He went back over the road without finding the lost sack of sweetness and he figured a clear loss for the day of \$8.00, but to his mental, as well as metal relief, late in the evening a phone message informed him that the lost sack had been set inside a door yard down toward the river.
