LIVESTOCK PRICES

Sheep are selling for the highest prices ever known. Cattle are higher than ever before at this time of the year. Hogs are about \$2 higher than they were two months ago and the prospects for the livestock interests never looked brighter from the producer's standpoint. There is also a strong prospect that these prices will continue for several months and perhaps for years. It looks good.

But there are two important things to remember and consider along with these prospects. As the Rural Spirit has so often pointed out, these high prices are for the benefit of the man who staid in the business, and not for the inducement of others to get into it. During the past few months we have repeatedly urged farmers and breeders not to dispose of their breeding herds because of low prices and showed them, very clearly, that it is the man who gets in at such a time as this is the man who stays in, and not the man who gets in at such a time as this, who wins out.

Another thing. Prices now are approaching the point where the consumer balks and when this happens, he won't buy beef steaks or pork chops, and then the 'stuff is off' and prices fall again.

The man who has good breeding livestock is due for a period of prosperity which looks like it might be a long one, but the man who has none will wish he had and when he does get it, will perhaps know enough to stay with it.—Rural Spirit.

Melancholia is usually due to indigestion; "the blues" are a digestive disorder.

A whole lemon in a glass of hot water every morning on rising, and less heavy food, is not only far cheaper than quinine at war prices, but it is productive of much more good.

To lick a piece of court plaster and put it over a fresh wound is to invite trouble. The saliva often contains pus-forming germs; furthermore, wounds should be kept open to promote free drainage.

Spring medicines always contain laxatives that hurry the unused heavy food out of the body before it has time to ferment, decompose and poison us. A far better plan is to eat only what heavy food the spring season requires.

Digestion begins in the mouth, providing the food is well masticated; but when digestion is not properly begun the food often fails to digest.

It is difficult to find a stomach disorder that is not due to the abuse of food, or the use of tobacco, coffee or alcohol.

BOOTH MURDER TRIAL COSTLY

District Attorney R. L. Conner, of Yamhill county, and James Burdett, of McMinnville, were in Dallas Friday calling on Judge H. H. Belt, with whom they had legal business to transact in connection with the Booth-Branson murder trials held in McMinnville a few weeks ago. Branson and the co-defendant, Mrs. Booth, who were accused of the murder of Mrs. Booth's husband, and found guilty at the trials, have appealed to the Supreme court as a last chance. The necessary papers have just been executed by Judge Belt for Branson's appeal. But it will be a month before Mrs. Booth's appeal can be perfected. Branson is being held in the county jail at McMinnville and Mrs. Booth is being held in the county jail of Multnomah county. Judge Belt states that the two cases have cost Yamhill county \$8,500.

VISION OF THE CAPITAL

Wonderful Foresight of Washington, Jefferson and L'Enfant.

Some time after the preliminary surveys for the future site of the city of Washington by L'Enfant, Washington and Jefferson arrived in Georgetown, staying for several days at the old Suters tavern. Each day, in company with Major L'Enfant, they rode over the country in order that every phase of the topography might be studied with relation to the great work they had in their minds. How splendid it is to think that we had a Washington and a Jefferson at such a moment: With their great vision, their knowledge of the past, their hope for the future, they looked out upon the wide Potomac and the woods and fields and saw the future capital rise like a mirage before their eyes.

This hill, which was later to be crowned by the dome of the capitol, seemed to L'Enfant to be like "a pedestal waiting for a monument." The gentle eminence from which the

wide plain sloped down to the Potomac was marked for the site of the "president's palace," not only that it would be distant from the halls of congress nor yet that it might be approached by the "grand magnificent avenue" to be called Pennsylvania, but that, above all, it might forever look out over the broad expanse of the Potomac, with the far hillsides rising as though to wall out the scene from desecration.

It was one of the splendid moments in the life of the new republic. Unhindered by years of haphazard development, by centuries of unforeseeable mistakes, by the power of vested interests, by the rapacity of private citizens, a nation's capital was to be planned and built such a capital as the world had never seen. It was to be as spacious as the dream of democracy. As dignified as the spirit of the men who had founded it. As beautiful as the vision of freedom out of which it had been born.—Charles H. Whitaker in New York Times

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
