COMMENCEMENT AT PACIFIC COLLEGE

Various Public Gatherings to
Which the Public is Cordial-
ly Invited.

The exercises of the twenty-third annual commencement of Pacific College begin with the concert of the music department Saturday evening in Wood-Mar Hall at 8 o'clock. An excellent program will be given, to which the public is invited. Admission is free to this concert, as to all the other exercises of Commencement week.

Sunday morning at 11 o'clock will occur the baccalaureate services for the class of 1916 of Pacific College and for the graduating class of the Academy. The baccalaureate sermon will be preached by President Levi T. Pennington. This service will occur at the Friends church.

The closing address to the Christian associations will be given Sunday evening at the Friends church, by Mrs. DeLong, assistant pastor of the White Temple Baptist church of Portland.

Monday afternoon will occur the annual commencement baseball game, in which the college team will oppose the alumni and old students.

Monday evening at Wood-Mar Hall will occur the class day program, and Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, in the same hall, the graduating exercises of Pacific Academy will take place, with the address given by Rev. W. H. Body. This will be followed in the evening by the annual program of the Alumni Association, which promises to be up to its usual high standard of excellence.

Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock will occur the commencement exercises of the class of 1916, the address being given by Thomas E. Jones, general secretary of the Young Friends Movement of the Five Years Meeting of Friends in America. The annual banquet of the Alumni Association of the college, which is by invitation only and will occur in the Imperial Hotel, will close the exercises of commencement week.

MEMORIAL DAY EXERCISES.

Despite the fact that the supply of roses was exceedingly short, Tuesday, owing to the backward spring weather, the dead were duly honored on this annual memorial occasion by the decoration of graves and in song and public gatherings.

Under the direction of the G. A. R. post the people gathered at the hall and, headed by the West Chehalis Cornet Band, the march was made to the cemetery, where a short service was held, after which the decoration of graves took place.

EWING YOUNG SCHOOL CLOSED

On last Friday Ewing Young School, District No. 10, Yamhill County, commonly known as West Chehalis, closed its year's work with a community dinner, a well rendered literary and musical program by the school, and addresses by Mrs. Emma Haley Frazelle, of Multnomah, and Geo. H. Himes, assistant secretary and curator of the Oregon Historical Society, Portland.

Mr. Himes had been heard here before and Mrs. Frazelle has been advised that she will be wanted again. Mr. Himes presented some facts of early Oregon History that he has just recently brought to light, and Mrs. Frazelle told of the work that is being done in Portland and elsewhere in Oregon to protect the un-initiated from the flood of improper literature offered for sale by publishers, under the guise of good literature.

Other visitors from Portland and Multnomah county were R. C. Bonser and wife, Mrs. Crider and John Baker. Mr. Bonser is a surveyor and years ago did some work in his line in this neighborhood. Mr. Baker was a former resident of this county. Mr. and Mrs. Bonser and wife were one-time acquaintances of the principal of the school, Mr. E. H. Anderson, to whom the meeting gave great pleasure. Residential visitors to the number of 50 graced the occasion with their presence.

The constant effort of the year was for a "better school" if possible, and the community through its general co-operation and its live Parent-Teacher Association has generously sustained the efforts of the school board and the teachers. During the year a number of entertainments have been given, and an obligation of \$75 on a piano that had been purchased the year before, has been cancelled. Some new apparatus has been added to the equipment and a new flag now replaces one that had done excellent service. We have just received our pennant, marking us as a standardized school.

The same teachers have been retained for the coming year and already plans are being worked out for a "better school" next year, thus helping to keep Yamhill County schools in the front rank of progress.

AUTO RUNS AMUCK AND DOES DAMAGE

Smashes Big Plate Glass Window

Music Store

At six o'clock on last Monday evening a big auto driven by Miss Drill, a Yamhill school teacher, smashed into the front of Kienle & Sons Music Store and made small fragments of a heavy plate glass window, besides damaging a Victrola pretty badly.

Miss Drill, who lives with her parents near Yamhill, was on her way home from Portland in company with an elderly gentleman named Wm. N. Sarff, where they had purchased the machine, which was a second hand car. On reaching Newberg a couple of tires had gone flat and they decided to go to a garage and have them repaired. They stopped in front of the Commercial stable and when they started for the Ballard garage the machine was headed to the west. The turn was partly made when Miss Drill, who was driving, lost control of the steering gear and the heavy car headed across the street, mounted the curb and banged into the front with results as stated above. The crash of the heavy plate glass as it fell on the cement pavement sounded a little like the approach of a young cyclone and it was remarkable that neither of the occupants of the car were cut by the glass.

Had the car been running with much speed the chances are the damage would have been much greater and the occupants of the car severely injured.

Mr. Sarff made a deposit of \$25 and said he would settle for the balance of the damage when it was found what it was.

Running an auto was new to Miss Drill and like many others, she failed to use the brake when she got into trouble.

COUNTRY LIFE COUN- CIL IS ORGANIZED

Farm Homes to Be Beautified—
Woman's Work to Be
Lightened.

The Country Life Council, a woman's auxiliary of the Agricultural Council, held its first meeting in the county agriculturalist's office at McMinnville last Saturday. Seven granges and farmers' union locals had representatives in attendance.

The object of the organization is to take up problems of the farm home, discuss them at the monthly or quarterly meetings of the council and enlist the co-operation of all the farmers' organizations in the same. The council is composed of one woman delegate from each agricultural organization in the county.

Community laundries of the "wet wash" variety will be advocated by the council. An attempt will be made to have the wet wash laundries of the cities extend their routes out into the country and thereby relieve the farm woman of one of the health wrecking weekly tasks. In some cases it may be advisable to establish laundries in the country districts in connection with creameries or other establishments where the work can be done economically.

Community canning of fruit for the home was also discussed. Other projects which will be taken up by the council are home beautification, modern kitchen conveniences, feeding harvest hands and entertaining. Discussion of the last named subject at the Saturday meeting brought out the fact that the very best form of entertainment at a farm home is absence of entertainment. By giving visitors the freedom of the home and farm, added comfort is assured for both guest and host.
