NEW PRUNE PEST

T. H. Hughes, a grower four miles northwest of Dallas, brought a young prune tree to town Friday to show the results of the work of a new pest on the roots of the tree. Six of the "worms" (though the pest has six legs on the foot part of the body and hair on its corrugated back) were brought in by Mr. Hughes. Dallas prunemen could not name the pest though several thought it looked like a grub bore. The pest injures the trees by eating away the roots and the bark of the underground part of the tree. The worm-like thing is about an inch and three-quarters long and greyish-white in color. Mr. Hughes has turned the exhibit over to W. V. Fuller of Dallas who will send them to the laboratory at the Oregon Agricultural college.—Polk Co. Observer.

No Common Cur.

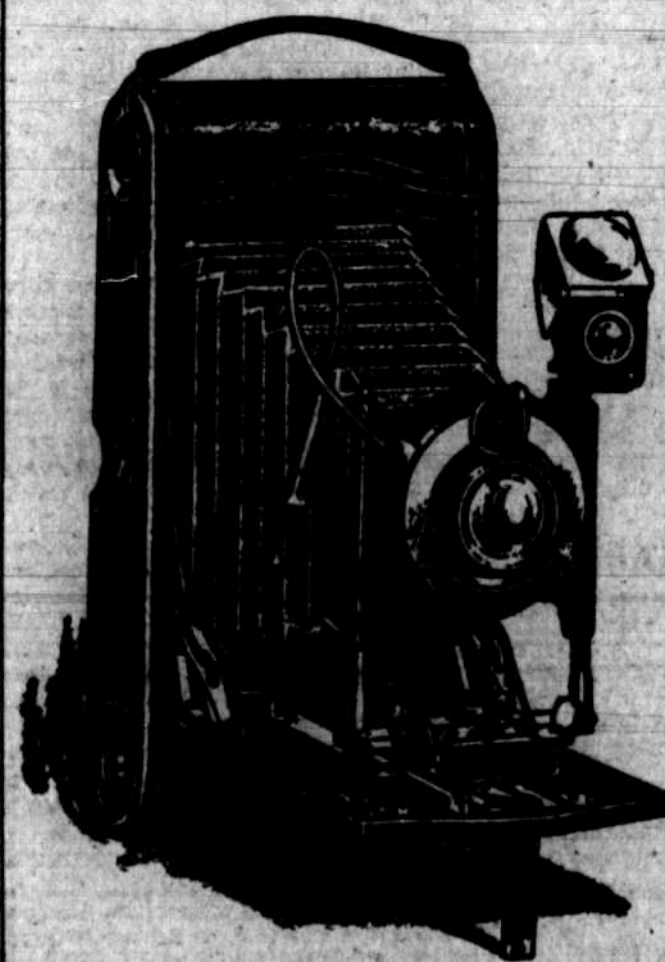
