Historical pageants are being held in the various sections of the state and these will be continued up to October, when the big event will be staged in the city of Indianapolis as outlined above.

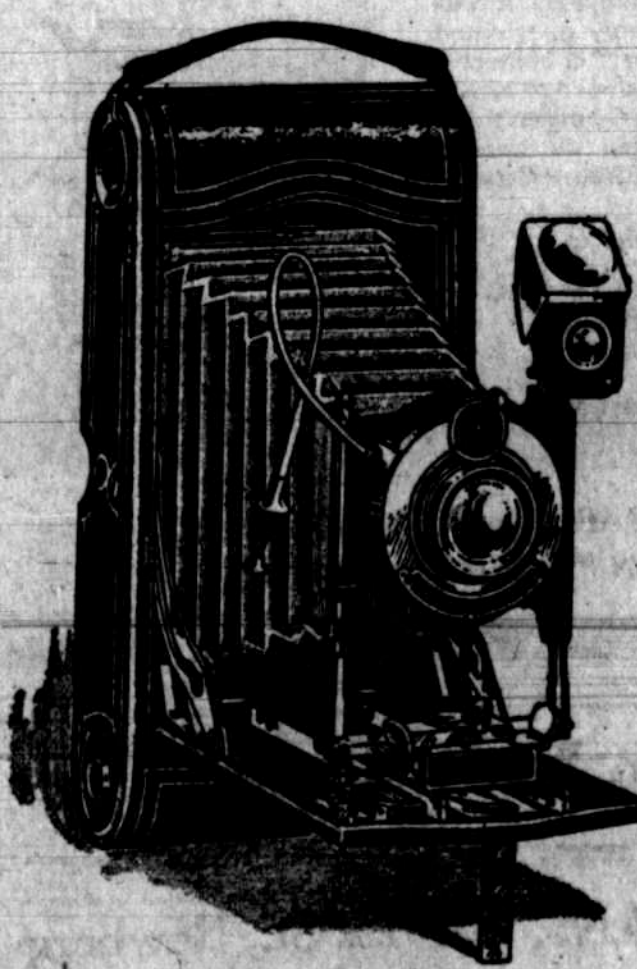
