TEST ASSOCIATION MEETS

The Yamhill county cow-testing association will hold its annual meeting Thursday, July 13, at Amity. All dairymen who are interested in herd improvement are invited. Speakers from the college will be present and successful dairymen from Yamhill, Polk and Marion counties will participate.

No one thing has done so much for herd improvement as the test association. It provides a systematic way by which dairymen may co-operate and keep records of individual cows at minimum cost. There are now 15 test associations in the state, Coos county being in the

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lead with five. Not a single test association has ever proved unprofitable.

In the older associations the average returns per cow have been increased from \$12 to \$25 annually as a result of an investment of \$1.25. Wise men go after investments where \$1.25 brings a return of \$12 or more. Robt. L. Tweed, a graduate of the O. A. C., has been employed to succeed Hartzel Crosby, the former tester. Mr. Tweed takes hold of the work like a veteran and will no doubt be a great help to the dairymen. His advice regarding feeding and care of the herd in addition to the records he takes should prove of inestimable value to those who want to improve.

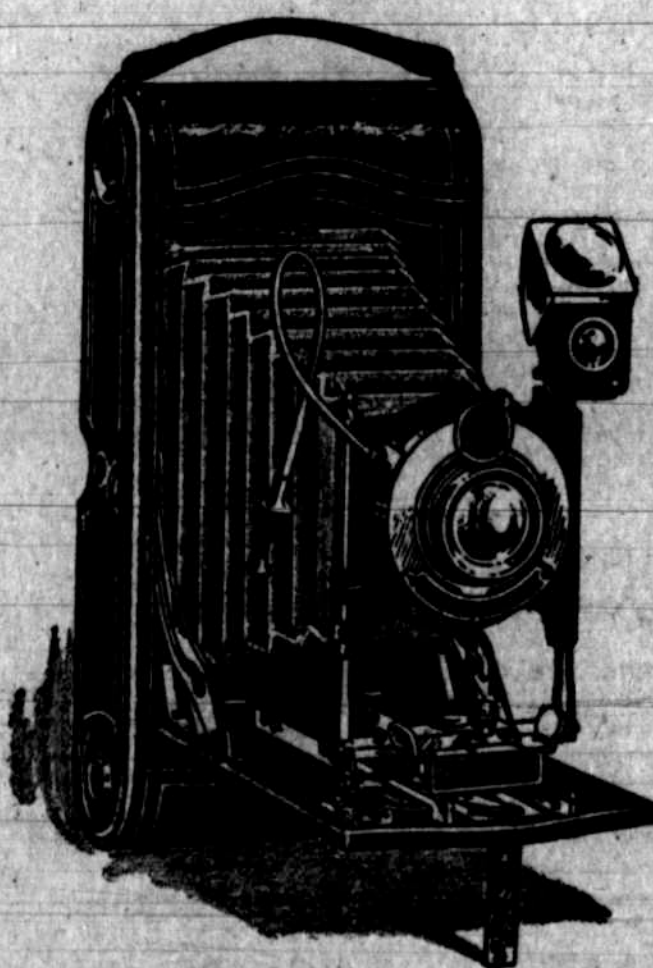
The news correspondent has been absent from Rex this week, therefore the list is rather short.
