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Hughes Points the Way

The speech of the Republican candi-
date for president, was a keynote
speech indeed. Not one person in the
great audience at the Carnegie hall
meeting was in doubt for one moment
as to just what he meant by every
thing he said.

His address was comprehensive, logi-
cal, clear and all sufficient for the oc-
casion. There can be no dispute as to
this. Plainly Mr. Hughes is a man
who "knows what he wants when he
wants it," and it is the opinion of po-
litical authorities who heard him and
who have since read his remarks that
he knows also how to get it.

It was incumbent upon the Republi-
can candidate to confine the scope of
his remarks to the limitations of the
occasion, but his crushing analysis of
the shortcomings of the present ad-
ministration of the government is
merely an earnest of what the tone
and the contents of his speeches will
be when he gets on the stump.

At Carnegie hall Mr. Hughes ad-
verted to every general question that
is apt to be a serious issue in the cam-
paign and in language that will be
absolutely clear to every man or wo-
man able to read he stated his opini-
ons, his convictions and his purposes.
On the stump he will argue these
points in detail. As an orator he is
eloquent, his personality attractive,
and his marshaling of facts so co-
hesive that he holds his audience to
the end. He makes it easy for them
to follow him, and his points are not
lost.

There was nothing equivocal, noth-
ing apologetic in the Republican can-
didate's speech of acceptance. He
called a spade a spade, and the unani-
mous opinion of those who heard him
was that he shot to the center and
rang the bell. The Republican cam-
paign is now open, and those who will
speak and write and work for the suc-
cess of the Republican ticket can wish
for no more adequate campaign docu-
ment, no more satisfactory statement
of issues than are found in the candi-
date's salutory.

WHAT ONE BIG MAN THINKS OF ANOTHER.

President W. M. F. Paunes of
Brown university is a pretty live

THE FLAG AND THE MAN.

DUTY OF THE ADMINISTRA- TION TO STOP PLOTS AND CONSPIRACIES.

We denounce all plots and
conspiracies in the interest of
any foreign nation. Utterly in-
tolerable is the use of our soil
for alien intrigues. Every Ameri-
can must unreservedly con-
demn them and support every
effort for their suppression. But
here also prompt, vigorous and
adequate measures on the part
of the administration were need-
ed. There should have been no
hesitation, no notion that it was
wise and politic to delay. Such
an abuse of our territory de-
manded immediate and then-
oughgoing action. As soon as
the administration had notice of
plots and conspiracies it was its
duty to stop them. It was not
lacking in resources. Its re-
sponsibility for their continu-
ance cannot be escaped by the
condemnation of others.—From

PROMISE TO REDUCE THE COST OF LIVING NOT KEPT.

Our opponents promised to re-
duce the cost of living. This
they have failed to do. But they
did reduce the opportunities of
making a living. Let us not for-
get the conditions that existed in
this country under the new tariff
prior to the outbreak of the war.
Production had decreased, busi-
ness was languishing, new enter-
prises were not undertaken. In-
stead of expansion there was
curtailment and our streets were
filled with the unemployed. What
ground is there for expecting
better conditions when the un-
healthy stimulus of the war has
spent its force and our industries
and workmen are exposed to
the competition of an energized
Europe?

MAINTENANCE OF AMERICAN RIGHTS.

Had this government by the
use of both informal and formal
diplomatic opportunities left no
doubt that when we said "strict
accountability" we meant pre-
cisely what we said and that we
should unhesitatingly vindicate
that position I am confident
that there would have been no
destruction of American lives by
the sinking of the Lusitania.
There we had ample notice—in
fact, published notice. Further-
more, we knew the situation, and
we did not require specific no-
tice. Instead of whittling away
our formal statements by equiv-
ocal conversations, we needed
the straight, direct and decisive
representations which every dip-
lomats and foreign office would
understand. I believe that in
this way we should have been
spared the repeated assaults on
American lives. Moreover, a firm
American policy would have been
strongly supported by our people
and the opportunities for the de-
velopment of bitter feeling would
have been vastly reduced.—From

THE COMPELLING PERORA- TION TO MR. HUGHES' ACCEPTANCE SPEECH.

We live in a fateful hour. In
a true sense, the contest for the
preservation of the Nation is
never ended. We must still be
imbued with the spirit of heroic
sacrifice which gave us our
country and brought us safely
through the days of civil war.
We renew our pledge to the an-
cient ideals of individual liberty,
of opportunity denied to none
because of race or creed, of un-
swerving loyalty. We have a
vision of America prepared and
secure; strong and just; equal
to her tasks; an exemplar of the
capacity and efficiency of a free
people. I endorse the platform
adopted by the Convention and
accept its nomination.

THE NATION IS SHOCKING- LY UNPREPARED.

It is apparent that we are
shockingly unprepared. There is
no room for controversy on this
point since the object lesson on
the Mexican border. All our
available regular troops (less, I
believe, than 50,000) are there
or in Mexico, and as these have
been deemed insufficient the en-
tire national guard has been or-
dered out. That is, we are sum-
moning practically all our mo-
bile military forces in order to
prevent bandit incursions. In
view of the warnings of the past
three years, it is inexcusable
that we should find ourselves in
this plight. For our faithful
guardmen, who with a fine pa-
triotism responded to this call
and are bearing this burden: I
have nothing but praise. But I
think it little short of absurd
that we should be compelled to
call men from their shops, their
factories, their offices and their
professions for such a purpose.
This, however, is not all. The
units of the national guard were
at peace strength, which was
only about one-half the required
strength. It was necessary to
bring in recruits, for the most
part raw and untrained. Only a
small percentage of the regiments
recruited up to war strength will
have had even a year's training
in the national guard, which at
the maximum means a hun-
dred hours of military drill, and
on the average, means much less.
Men fresh from their peaceful
employments and physically un-
prepared have been hurried to
the border for actual service.
They were without proper equip-
ment, without necessary sup-
plies; suitable conditions of trans-
portation were not provided. Men
with dependent families were
sent, and conditions which should
have been well known were dis-
covered after the event. And
yet the exigency, comparatively
speaking, was not a very grave
one. It involved nothing that
could not readily have been fore-
seen during the past three years
of disturbance and required only
a modest talent for organization.
That this administration while
pursuing its course in Mexico
should have permitted such con-
ditions to exist is almost in-
credible.—From Mr. Hughes'

"AMERICA FIRST AND AMER- ICA EFFICIENT."

We come to state in a plain
and direct manner our faith, our
purpose and our pledge. This
representative gathering is a
happy augury. It means the
strength of reunion. It means
that the party of Lincoln is re-
stored, alert, effective. It means
the unity of a common percep-
tion of paramount national
needs. It means that we are
neither deceived nor humbled
by abnormal conditions. We
know that we are in a critical
period, perhaps more critical
than any period since the civil
war. We need a dominant
sense of national unity, the ex-
ercise of our best constructive
powers, the vigor and resource-
fulness of a quickened America.
We desire that the Republican
party as a great liberty party
shall be the agency of national
achievement, the organ of the
effective expression of dominant
Americanism. What do I mean
by that? I mean America con-
scious of power, awake to obli-
gation, erect in self respect, pre-
pared for every emergency, de-
voted to the ideals of peace, in-
different to the spirit of human
brotherhood, safeguarding both
individual opportunity and the
public interest, maintaining a
well ordered constitutional sys-
tem adapted to local self gov-
ernment without the sacrifice of
essential national authority, ap-
preciating the necessity of sta-
bility, expert knowledge and
thorough organization as the in-
dispensable conditions of secu-
rity and progress; a country
loved by its citizens with a pa-
triotic fervor permitting no divi-
sion in their allegiance and no
rivals in their affection—I mean
America first and America effi-
cient. It is in this spirit that I
respond to your summons.—

my judgment cannot defeat this
movement. If women are to
have the vote, as I believe they
are, it seems to me entirely
clear that in the interest of the
public life of this country the
contest should be ended prompt-
ly. I favor the vote for women.
