Himes, of the Oregon Historical Society, was giving him valuable assistance in order that it may be historically correct. The river and the plot of ground where the meeting was held is shown, and of course Meek is the central figure, as, with raised hand, he makes the call for the "divide." The artist says that when the painting is completed he will consider nothing less than \$10,000 for it. Mr. Abernethy says that with one of the old saloon buildings of Champoe being used by a famous artist and the other by a religious sect for holding divine services, time works some changes in the historic old town.
