When a doctor has a call three miles distant he can reach the patient in nine minutes at the reasonable city rate of speed of twenty miles an hour. If he travels twice as fast, breaking law and endangering lives, he saves half the nine minutes for the benefit of the patient, who in most cases, if not all, would be in little danger on account of the few minutes' difference. This is probably the point of view of the judge who fines the physician, and citizens generally will agree that he is dispensing wise justice and proper punishment.—Oregonian.

This is the way the New York Herald, Independent, puts it in commenting on the Maine election:

You see how it is, Mr. Hughes! You went to Maine and talked tariff to the voters—gave them more tariff talk than you have given any other voters since you began your campaign. You talked tariff to such an extent and in such a good, strong American way that you stirred Mr. Samuel Untermyer to protest; but, what is of much more importance just now, you stirred the voters of Maine to roll up the largest Republican plurality known in a state election since 1904.

Now, Mr. Hughes, keep on talking tariff—the tariff that means protection! You are on safe ground, for upon that kind of tariff depends the salvation of this country in the crucial period that will come when the war in Europe ends.

### WHY NOT BE HONEST?

"It cannot be disputed that Charles E. Hughes is the candidate of the Old Guard in the Republican party and that his nomination was machine-made by bosses of the old school—Penrose Barnes, Crane and Smoot."—The Guard.

The Democratic newspapers that are making this statement know it is not true. They are merely relying upon the well-known theory that an untruth uttered often enough and positively enough will finally come to be accepted as a fact.

The only semblance of truth in such an assertion is that Mr. Hughes was nominated by a convention in which sat representatives of the "Old Guard" of the Republican party. Yet everyone knows that he was not the choice of the Old Guard. He was so clearly the choice of Republicans everywhere that no other candidate for the nomination could even be considered. This was demonstrated by the tremendous popular vote he received in the Oregon primary against such a

well known progressive as Senator Cummins.

In exactly the same way President Wilson was renominated at St. Louis by a convention in which were seated emissaries of unspeakable Tammany Hall and of such reactionary bosses as Murphy and Sullivan and Taggart; but no one of sound political judgment presumes to say that he was the choice of the reactionary element of his party as opposed to Democrats in general.

The facts in the case are that both Mr. Hughes and Mr. Wilson are over-whelmingly the choice of the rank and file of their parties and that neither is particularly popular with the old bosses. Both owe their nominations to a public demand that was far too strong to be ignored.

It is nothing less than idle foolishness to assert that Mr. Hughes is the nominee of the Old Guard and it would be equally idle to claim that Mr. Wilson was nominated by Tammany Hall. Each is undeniably the favorite of the masses of his party. The Guard and other Democratic papers know this as well as anyone, but they are not honest enough or fair enough to admit it.—Oregon Register.
