BURNING OF THE CONGRESS IS REPRODUCED

Saturday night and Sunday night, September 30 and October 1, respectively, is to be given the first demonstration of a new kind of moving picture. Instead of using a film and throwing a picture on a screen at a theatre, fireworks are to be used and animated reproductions of such events as the recent burning of the steamship "Congress" and the eruption at Mt. Lassen in California are to be given. The exhibition is said to be the most gorgeous and thrilling performance ever staged in the West.

The show will be staged in the base ball park at Portland, and is being backed by a company recently formed by F. G. Hartley, the live wire of Astoria.

The events connected with the burning of the Congress and the destruction of the town of Lassen by molten lava are still fresh in the public mind. The steamer took fire when 30 miles at sea, and was turned for a race to safety at Coos Bay. Every life was saved, but the ship was almost a total loss. It is proposed to reproduce the scenes near the shore. The boat will be seen heading in at the entrance to the bay, then the lowering of the boats and the burning of the ship.

The eruption of Mt. Lassen, which is the only active volcano in the United States, was a wonderful spectacle, and the picture in living fire is guaranteed to furnish a thrill with every breath.

Reproductions of Multnomah Falls, with the water falling over the cliff, of Lewis and Clark meeting the Indians of the Columbia River, of an immigrant train in motion, pictures of Charles Evans Hughes and of Woodrow Wilson, and the explosion of bombs, batteries, geyzers and other pieces of fireworks will fill in the program of two hours. McElroy's band will play a concert during the evening. The show is said to be worth the trouble of a trip to Portland.

FARM NOTES BY COUNTY AGENT

Dayton is going to hold a corn show some time late in October. The exact date and the prize list and classification will be made known later. Dayton is in the heart of a large corn-growing district and this year's crop is better than usual. The show ought therefore to be a good one.

APPLE TREE ANTHRACNOSE

The Plant Disease Committee of the Agricultural Council agreed that apple tree anthracnose is one of the most difficult diseases to control and asked that it be placed on my list of projects.

Now is the time and the only time to fight it. Apple tree anthracnose is a fungus that sends out its spores in the late summer and early fall. It is necessary to thoroughly coat the limbs and small branches with a fungicide at this time to prevent the infection which would otherwise take place as soon as the fall rains begin. Bordeaux 4-4-50 is the best spray to use. In badly infested orchards another spraying should be given after the fruit is picked, using a 6-6-50 solution at that time.

TREAT SEED FOR SMUT

Seeding time is upon us and every farmer should remember that only by proper treatment of seed can smut be prevented. Formalin, or a forty per cent. solution of formaldehyde should be used. It must be diluted one to thirty or forty and every grain must be covered by this solution. This can be done by dipping or spreading out the grain on a tight floor and shoveling it back and forth after the solution has been poured over it.

HONORABLE MENTION

Some people have little respect for lawyers and class them all as bloodsuckers. While in McMinnville Saturday, business took us to the office of a prominent attorney and long-time resident of that city. We had to wait until he had finished with a client, to whom he was giving the closing words, which were to the effect that he did not have a good case and that he had better personally see the one with whom he was having trouble and effect a settlement on the best terms he could. His client decided to accept the advice and paid him his charge of \$1.50 therefor. It is quite likely he would have received a fee of \$25 if he had advised contesting the case and gone with it into the courts. It is easy to see why that attorney is one of the respected citizens of this county.—Carlton Sentinel.
