John I. Knight, the official booster for the McMinnville Round-up, may be able to tame the long-horn steers and bucking bronchos, but we doubt his ability to handle the newspaper publishers to whom he has addressed letters making certain "demands" for free space. Last week he sent copy for a four-inch double column display advertisement for two insertions in the Graphic and this week he sent a full column of eight-point reading matter to be inserted as a "free press notice." Had Mr. Knight reversed his proposition, proposing to pay for the column of reading matter and asked for free insertion of the display, it would have looked better from this end of the line.

MR. HUGHES HIS OWN BOSS

While Mr. Hughes was still in the West there was a growing impression in the rest of the country that he was not arousing as great enthusiasm as had been anticipated. The Globe-Democrat frankly admitted it, at the time, and set forth some of the conditions responsible for readers getting such a mistaken impression. After his speech of acceptance, Mr. Hughes confined

his attention to his immediate work. Belief in certain myths about him had been carefully fostered. He had to dispel these. He did it in his 14,000-mile tour. Correspondents of such papers as the New York Times, editorially supporting Mr. Wilson, admit that he convinced his hearers everywhere that he was a red-blooded man, capable, intellectually honest, courageous and bent on establishing efficiency in the public service. When he said he would veto extravagant appropriations, it was not taken as an idle campaign promise. People knew he meant every word of it. Some remembered that he had vetoed items amounting to \$5,000,000 the last year he was governor of New York and that he had disapproved of over 200 bills that were wrong in principle or deficient in other respects. When he said he would serve the whole people, his hearers believed him. They knew that he had never been bossed, that he had never swapped patronage for support of his measures and that he was not under obligations to any machine, individual or set of individuals for his nomination. He concluded his tour in Maine and the election last Monday showed what Maine voters thought of Hughes, after seeing and hearing him. They saw that he was every inch a man and not a weathervane, shifted by every vagrant breeze. They knew that whatever emergency might arise, he could be trusted to do what was right, without giving a thought to the effect on his personal fortunes.

Mr. Hughes, however, is no political novice. He reserved the detailed discussion of recent legislation until Congress adjourned and the president had set his seal upon it. He has already shown the flimsy character of some of it and the iniquitous principles of other parts of it. He will not waste all his ammunition at once, however, for interest must be sustained until November. On one subject he has remained discreetly reticent, with high purpose. He expects to be elected president and to have to deal with our troubles with certain European belligerents. He wants to be able to do this without any handicap of prejudice, and the opposition, which would make political capital out of anything under heaven, cannot goad him into saying anything that might cause any country to look upon him as its enemy. He is running his own campaign, just as he will be his own boss as president.—Globe-Democrat.

FIRE PREVENTION DAY

The anniversary of the Chicago conflagration is October 9th and nearly every state in the Union will observe this as "Fire Prevention Day." The Insurance Department of Oregon wishes to urge the observance of this day and earnestly requests the municipal officers to call the attention of the citizens of their community to the need of fire prevention.

Fire prevention means good housekeeping; the cleaning out of attics, store rooms, closets and basements; the proper disposal of rubbish; repairing defective flues and chimneys; repairing gas fixtures and electric light cords; making heating plants and stoves safe; and proper storage of gasoline. Try fire prevention once and you will find it is to your interest. I am sure the cleaning up of places will mean

sanitation as well as fire prevention.

And I appeal to every school district to hold appropriate exercises and fire drills. If any schools are interested probably this department can offer suggestions for the school program.
