TOM RICHARDSON IN TOWN

The irrepressible Tom Richardson, the father of boosters, spent the day in Newberg Tuesday, and as usual, let the populace know he was here.

Soon after he arrived in the forenoon he went to the college where he gave a talk to the faculty and students and a number of others who gathered for the occasion, which was very highly appreciated by those who were privileged to hear him.

In the evening he was banqueted by a representative number of business men at the Imperial hotel, after which all gathered at the club rooms where more speech making was engaged in.

Mr. Richardson is always loyal to home industries and he devoted a good deal of time to Newberg enterprises which he highly commended. OBITUARY

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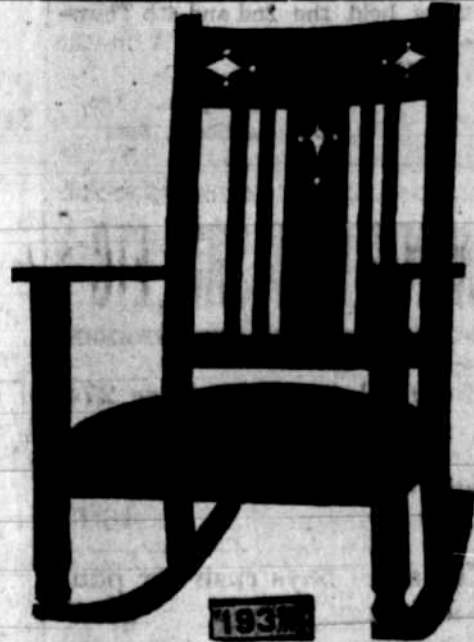
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
