INCREASED USE OF CIGARETTES

Increasing use of cigarettes, report of November 4, from Washington, D. C.: "Increasing issue of stamps for cigarettes by internal revenue bureau; 688,000,000 more cigarettes used in July, 1916, than in July, 1915. Increase of August, 1916, over August, 1915, over one billion cigarettes."

Out of over 278 boys between the ages of ten and fifteen in the Illinois State Reformatory 92 per cent were in the habit of smoking cigarettes at the time they were committed; 85 per cent had become so addicted to their use as to be classed as cigarette fiends.

Dr. L. Bremer, physician at St. Vincent Hospital for the insane, St. Louis, Missouri, says: "The boy who smokes at seven will drink whiskey at fourteen, take up morphine at twenty-five and wind up with cocaine and the rest of the narcotics at thirty and later on."
