First Annual Report of Associated Charities

Associated Charities of the city of Newberg was organized Dec. 6, 1915. The object of the association was to federate, as far as possible, the charity work of the city being carried on under separate organizations, and in a more thorough and systematic way give assistance to those in need.

F. C. Stannard was appointed president of the association and the following organizations voted to federate: Ladies Aid Friends church, Ladies Aid Methodist church, Adelpian Society Baptist church, Ladies Aid Presbyterian church, Young Peoples Christian Union, W. C. T. U., Wednesday Club, Civic Club, Girls L. S. of high school, I. O. O. F. lodge, Rebecca lodge and Parent-Teacher association. Each of the organizations appointing its vice-president to co-operate with the president.

In order to care adequately and to furnish a more efficient means of distributing charity, the board divided the city into six districts, appointing a superintendent for each. All cases of need in a given district to be reported to its superintendent.

Soon after the association organized a strong plea was made for discarded clothing and the city hall made the clearance house for same. That the people of Newberg responded liberally is shown by the following distribution:

Twenty-eight suits ladies underwear, 21 ladies waists, 25 ladies skirts, 10 ladies suits, 10 ladies coats, 8 men's shirts, 2

boys shirts, 8 boys waists, 5 pr. boys pants, 11 boys coats, 4 boys suits, 7 boys hats, 8 boys caps, 1 pr. boys leggins, 28 girls dresses, 3 girls coats, 6 children's suits, 5 pr. children's rompers, 2 pr. children's mittens, 2 pr. children's pajamas, 1 child's sweater, 77 pr. shoes for men, women and children, 55 pr. hose for men, women and children, 4 wash cloths, 24 wool blocks for quilt, 4 sacks potatoes, 14 qts. fruit, 2 lbs. butter.

There are some garments on hand but we have had recent calls for shoes for children five, seven and ten years of age, which we could not supply.

The board is sincerely grateful to all who, in any way, helped make the first year of Associated Charity work a successful one, and asks a continuation of your support for the coming year's work.
