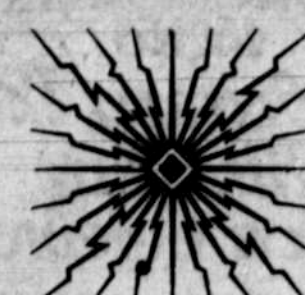

Indian Relics.

A copper banner stone or ceremonial weapon of ancient Indian days, which was unearthed in Fond du Lac during the digging of a sewer, is shaped like an ancient battle-axe and has two blades and a hole for a handle.
