Ordinance No. 415, Calling for Grading Parkings

An ordinance providing for grading all parkings between sidewalks and the traveled portions of highways in the city of Newberg and providing a penalty for violation hereof.

The people of the city of Newberg do ordain as follows:

Section 1—Whenever any sidewalk shall have been constructed at grade within the corporate limits of the city of Newberg, it shall be the duty of the owner of the premises so improved to immediately cause the parking space between the said sidewalk and the traveled portion of the street to be graded to grade, either by filling or excavating said portion of said parking space.

Section 2—If the owner of any premises improved as aforesaid shall fail to so grade said parking space to grade within ten days after the construction of such sidewalk shall have been completed, the Recorder of the city of Newberg shall then notify such owner that unless he grades said parking to grade as required by section one hereof within ten days after notice, the city of Newberg will cause said work to be done and the cost thereof charged against the property, which said notice may be given by mailing same to the last known address of such property owner and such mailing shall be conclusive evidence that the same has been received in due course.

Section 3—At the expiration of ten days after the mailing of said notice, if said property owner has not then caused said parking space to be graded to grade, the council of the city of Newberg shall then cause said work to be done in the same manner as other street improvements are done and shall charge the cost thereof against the said property, and all such cost shall be a lien against such property from and after the date the same is docketed in the lien docket.

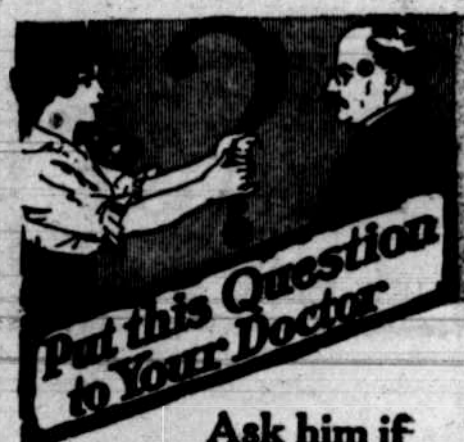
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
