"This is the greatest measure ever contemplated by the state of Oregon," said Governor Withycombe, discussing the \$6,000,000 road bond bill at the statewide good roads rally in Portland. "It means more to the state than any measure in its history, because the one thing we need is highways in Oregon."

Somebody suggests that we should eat more fish in order to save the cost of high priced beef and pork, but like everything else, the big fish companies control the market and salmon at twenty cents a pound is the result. Not much saving in that. The lowly smelt are alone able to beat the combine and sacrifice themselves for the relief of the public. In their season they come in such numbers they force the market down so that all can eat fish.

The Graphic favors the road bonding proposition. It furnishes a basis for permanent road building in Oregon and so far none who are opposing it have offered anything in its place that is worth considering. Auto trucks for heavy hauling and automobiles have come to stay and nothing short of hard surface roads will hold them up—that is, the main traveled roads where the traffic is continuous and heavy, such as the road between

Newberg and Portland where practically all the travel on the west side of the Willamette from Corvallis north, concentrates.

The ballot for the referendum election, which will be held June 4, will be of reasonable proportions as but eight measures are to be voted on. They will appear on the ballot in the order given herewith:

First—Authorizing ports to create limited indebtedness to encourage water transportation.

Second—A bill for taxation of Oregon and California Land Grant.

Third—Limiting number of bills introduced, and increasing pay of legislators.

Fourth—Declaration against implied repeal of constitutional provisions by amendments thereto.

Fifth—Uniform tax classification amendment.

Sixth—Requiring election of city, town and state officers at same time.

Seventh—Four hundred thousand dollar tax levy for a new penitentiary.

Eighth—Six million dollar road bond issue and highway bill.

Pamphlets containing the texts of the measures with the argument submitted for and against each of them have been mailed to the voters and it is now up to all who contemplate voting at the election to post themselves and be prepared to vote intelligently.

Here they have retained their natural traits and as the chapter of European horrors is daily written the reali-

zation is forced upon us that to find the German of the type who made Germany really great in the sciences, music, commerce and all that makes the world better we must look, not in Germany itself, but to Germans who left their native land to escape a system which has culminated in present horrors.—Hillsboro Independent.
